

BAPTISM

What is the meaning of baptism?

Baptism is a public demonstration of your faith in Jesus as your savior. It is an outward expression of the inward work Jesus has done in your life by dying on the cross for your sins and rising from the dead. Baptism is like a wedding ring - it's the outward sign of the commitment you have made in your heart (see Ephesians 2:8-9).

Baptism illustrates Jesus's death, burial, and resurrection. As 1 Corinthians 15:3-4 says, "Jesus died for our sins... He was buried... and He rose again." We see the inward, spiritual significance of baptism mirrored in Colossians 2:12 which says, "For when you were baptized, you were buried with Christ, and in baptism you were also raised with Him."

As a symbol of the death, burial, and resurrection of Jesus, baptism also symbolizes your new life as a Christian. 2 Corinthians 5:17 tells us, "When someone becomes a Christian, they become a brand-new person inside. The old life has passed away, and a new life has begun!" We know also that as Paul taught in Romans 6:4, "We were therefore buried with him through baptism into death in order that, just as Jesus was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, we too may live a new life!"

Who should be baptized?

Every person who has put their trust in Jesus as their Lord and Savior. Being baptized does not make you a Christian. The Bible clearly teaches that we are saved by grace through faith and according to God's mercy (see Ephesians 2:8-9; Titus 3:5). The thief on the cross next to Jesus had no time to be baptized; yet Jesus promised that he would be with Him in Paradise that day (see Luke 23:43).

A Christian realizes that their sin separated them from God. They give up all efforts to reach God through good works or religious activity. They conclude that Jesus's death on the cross for their sins is the only means of salvation and reconciliation between them and God. If you have come to that point in your spiritual journey, then you are ready to be baptized (Acts 2:41; 8:12-13).

Why should I be baptized?

Baptism is commanded by Jesus in Matthew 28:19-20 when He told His disciples, "Go then, to all people everywhere and make them my disciples, baptizing them in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, and then teach them to obey everything that I have commanded you."

Jesus's disciples also taught that all believers should be baptized as Jesus commanded them to (Acts 2:38, Mark 1:9). Jesus said in John 14:23, "If you love me, you will keep my commands." Choosing to be baptized is an act of love and obedience to Jesus.

Why be baptized by immersion?

The word "baptism" means "to dip under the water." Baptism by immersion simply means dipping a person completely under the water and raising them back out again. We know that Jesus was baptized this way as it says in Matthew 3:16. In fact, every baptism we see in the Bible was by immersion. For example, Acts 8:38-39 says, "... then both Philip and the man went down into the water and Philip baptized him. When they came up out of the water..." Baptism by immersion also best symbolizes a burial and resurrection (see Romans 6:1-11).

What about children?

All instances of baptism in the Bible followed an individual's decision to trust Jesus alone for their salvation (Acts 2:41; 8:12, 36-38; 10:47-48). The Bible shows no example of baptism when the person did not request it. At Calvary Chapel Olympia, we wait until the child is old enough to believe and understand the true meaning of baptism before we baptize them. When a child makes a decision to follow Jesus, we like to discuss baptism with the parents and the child to make sure they understand what they are doing and why it's important.

If you have not been baptized as an adult, though you may have been baptized as a baby or as a child, the full meaning and significance of baptism has yet to take place in your life. We strongly encourage you to be baptized as a professing follower of Jesus.
