1 The words of the Teacher, son of David, king in Jerusalem: 2 "Meaningless! Meaningless!" says the Teacher. "Utterly meaningless! Everything is meaningless." 3 What do people gain from all their labors at which they toil under the sun? 4 Generations come and generations go, but the earth remains forever. 5 The sun rises and the sun sets, and hurries back to where it rises. 6 The wind blows to the south and turns to the north; round and round it goes, ever returning on its course. 7 All streams flow into the sea, yet the sea is never full. To the place the streams come from, there they return again. 8 All things are wearisome, more than one can say.

(Ecclesiastes 1:1-8a, NIV)

The book of Ecclesiastes in the Bible reads like something that accidentally got included. The author's response to the apparent chaos is cynicism, hopelessness, and fatalism. These feelings are relatable, even if only temporarily. This highlights the difficulty of pursuing your purpose in an unpredicatable world.

- **25** On one occasion an expert in the law stood up to test Jesus. "Teacher," he asked, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?"
- 26 "What is written in the Law?" he replied. "How do you read it?"
- **27** He answered, "'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind'; and, 'Love your neighbor as yourself."
- **28** "You have answered correctly," Jesus replied. "Do this and you will live."
- **29** But he wanted to justify himself, so he asked Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?"

During his ministry, Jesus was regularly in debates. This one started with a question about what really matters.

And the person Jesus used as the hero? A Samaritan, a member of an ethnic group that the listeners hated.

- **30** In reply Jesus said: "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, when he was attacked by robbers. They stripped him of his clothes, beat him and went away, leaving him half dead. 31 A priest happened to be going down the same road, and when he saw the man, he passed by on the other side. 32 So too, a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. 33 But a Samaritan, as he traveled, came where the man was; and when he saw him, he took pity on him. 34 He went to him and bandaged his wounds, pouring on oil and wine. Then he put the man on his own donkey, brought him to an inn and took care of him. 35 The next day he took out two denarii and gave them to the innkeeper. 'Look after him,' he said, 'and when I return, I will reimburse you for any extra expense you may have.'
- **36** "Which of these three do you think was a neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of robbers?"
- **37** The expert in the law replied, "The one who had mercy on him."

Jesus told him, "Go and do likewise."
