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A NOTE FROM BISHOP BILL ATWOOD



I'm excited to introduce Bishop Fanuel Magangani to you. Bishop Fanuel is the Bishop of Northern Malawi, which is the fourth poorest nation in the world. Their challenges are beyond imagination. Ten years ago, Bishop Fanuel came to my office as a brand new Bishop seeking financial

partnership. Because of Malawi's great poverty, my experience told me if we only focus on aid, there will never be enough resources.

We needed to break the cycle of poverty.

Last month, I had the pleasure to meet with Bishop Fanuel, and we reminisced about what happened after we first met a decade ago, and where things are now. Bishop Fanuel remembers that first meeting well and the impact it has Bishop Fanuel Magangani made.



When we met years ago, I told Bishop Fanuel, "I think there is an answer that may surprise you. In an emergency, there is a call for outside aid, but for the long term, we need to look at breaking the spirit of poverty. God wants to help us with that!"

While this wasn't the answer he expected, Bishop Fanuel resonated with this and went on to describe the impact and symptoms of this Spirit of Poverty. "...the spirit of poverty produces the spirit of dependence. So, by that spirit of dependence you are left with a mind of 'we can't do anything, we have nothing.' You can't see that you have opportunity, you only see problems.

So I told Bishop Fanuel, "The answer to the problem is actually a question. You need to answer the question, 'What is in your hand?"

Bishop Fanuel returned to Malawi. Once home, he went on a prayer retreat, and clarity came for his Bishop's Charge to his diocese. The two phases were "Breaking the Spirit of Poverty," followed by "What is in your hand?"

That is when things began to change. A youth praise band said, "What is in our hands? Our instruments. We have instruments in our hands." They wrote a song and traveled around the Diocese singing their "What is in your hands?" song. Working together and sacrificing, the Diocese bought a printing press and began printing and selling Prayer Books both for the Anglican Church in Malawi and for the Roman Catholic Church! All over the Diocese, people were asking "What is in your hands" and new ideas and projects surfaced everywhere! Continued on p2...


