Resurrection to Eternal Life

A good friend of mine was a director for a group who trained church leaders across six continents. (Darn you, Antarctica!) When he would interview applicants to work for the group, he would ask them to give him their "Christian elevator pitch." What he meant by that was to have them share the gospel with him in under two minutes, on the spot, without

preparation. He figured if they could do this, they were likely a good candidate for his group; if they could not, well... better luck next time.

If you had only two minutes to share your faith with someone, what would you include, and what would you leave out? Hopefully you'd include things like the Bible, the Trinity, the

Creation, the Fall, the promise of a Messiah, the incarnation, the life and ministry of Jesus, and most certainly you'd include the death and resurrection of Jesus. You'd probably include a few personal faith details like your Baptism, when your faith in the mercy and grace of God in Jesus became "real" to you, and the ups and downs of being a follower of Jesus. Looking ahead, you'd probably include something about what happens to you when you die, and our ultimate hope of the resurrection of the body and eternal life in the new creation. If you could speak quickly, you might be able to include a few things like predestination, the

sovereignty of God, the sacraments, and the importance of worship and devotion to the Word of God.

But let's say you didn't have 2 minutes. Let's say you had 10 seconds to give your "Christian elevator pitch," 10 seconds to share your faith, what would you include—and what

would you leave out? You might be inclined to recite John 3:16 and call it a day. (You certainly could do a lot worse!) But John 3:16 doesn't contain the most important events in all history: the death and resurrection of Jesus!

Here's my on-the-spot, no preparation 10 second "Christian elevator pitch:" Jesus Christ

lived a perfect life, died on the cross, rose from the dead, and has all authority in heaven and earth. Because of him you are love and forgiven and will live forever!

I'm sure if I could have time to go back and edit this, I would find numerous ways to improve it, but I wanted to give you the on-the-spot version, so there it is—no edits or anything.

Why does all of this matter? It doesn't, really, but a 2 minute pitch, or a 10 second pitch,

Change

There are probably some who read the title and chose to skip over this article for the simple reason that they don't like change. Others have read the title, and thought, "Let me know where, and I'll be there!" But the reason I chose to write on this topic this month is not to learn how you react to change, but rather to lead us to consider what an Easter narrative from Scripture has to teach us on how to deal with change, and to see the opportunities we will have to practice what we hear in God's Word in the coming days, weeks, and months.

Is there a day in all of history filled with more change than Easter? The Son of Man, Jesus the Messiah, did what He predicted He would do: HE ROSE FROM THE GRAVE! But it didn't just have lasting impact for Him and His life, but for ours today, as well. But, instead of focusing on a Resurrection account, I want to take us to Easter afternoon (Luke 24:13-35). Clopas and an unnamed disciple are journeying to Emmaus, which was about 7 miles from Jerusalem. As they do so, the risen Lord Jesus appears to them, but they are kept from recognizing Him. They let on to Him that things did not turn out as they had planned, saying, "We had hoped that he (Jesus—whom they are speaking with) was the one to redeem Israel" (v. 21).

The change they were looking for hadn't come, or so they thought. And this is what Jesus makes clear to them in His response to them, in verses 25-26, "O foolish ones, and slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have spoken! Was it not necessary that the Christ should suffer these things and enter into his glory?" If we stopped after these words of Jesus, we might assume that His teaching on how to deal with change is simply the command, "BELIEVE." But we, in and of ourselves, simply cannot do this. And it is for this reason, that

we listen to what happens next, "And beginning with Moses and all the prophets, he interpreted to them in all the Scriptures the things concerning himself" (v. 27).

Simply put, Jesus teaches His disciples to deal with change they are experiencing in their lives by listening to Him, and His Word, which is always pointing to Him. Don't believe me, or think this is an isolated incident in Scripture? Consider the actions of the Disciples in the book of Acts. Consider the great change that takes place at Pentecost in Acts 2: people hear in their own native language the mighty works of God (v. 11)—maybe, just maybe, the Good News, Gospel message of Jesus. Afterwards thousands come to faith in Christ, through the proclamation of God's Word by the Apostle Peter, and repentance which brought about the baptism of these individuals (Acts 2:14-41). But, after all

of that takes place, what happens next, in the following verse? "And they devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching, and the fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers." The first action that we hear the community of Christ doing in Jerusalem is LISTENING to the witness and testimony of the Apostles, or those who saw the Lord Jesus risen from the dead.

Let's be honest, our congregation is going to see and face many changes this month, not only will we experience a new worship schedule, different from what we've been doing for almost a year now (for more on that, check out the Elder's Report in the Epistle, and if you have any further questions, do not hesitate to reach out to your Elder), but we will also see Pastor Duncan leave to become the next Senior Pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church and School, in Waconia, MN. This goes without saying, but not only will this be a loss for our congregation, this is going to be a loss for me—personally. The candor and friendship that you see between us each Sunday morning is real (neither of us are that good of actors), and I doubt it will be something that I experience again in my ministry. I too, along with you, have learned many things from Pastor Duncan; he has challenged me to become a better student of Scripture day in and day out, and has led me to see, many a time, how incredible our theology of "Scripture interprets Scripture" truly is.

So, on the cusp of many changes that we will experience together as the body of Christ, this month, and in the months to come, it is my hope and prayer that we follow the teaching of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the example of the Disciples, and listen to the changeless Word of our God, in the midst of our ever-changing world.

while entertaining to think about, reveals what we truly prize most in our faith. How many of those 120 or 10 seconds is about Jesus? How many of those minutes or seconds is about what he has done for us?

It matters because for the last four and a half years, one of the things I've tried to show you from Scripture—in sermons, Bible studies, devotions, and everyday conversation—is that our hope is not to die and go to heaven, but to be raised from the dead like Jesus was raised from the dead—to a life that cannot be destroyed. And that this resurrection will take place when Jesus returns and, in his words, makes all things new—gets rid of sin, the effects of sin, and the potential for sin, and that we can live life as it was meant to be lived: in fellowship with each other, and in the presence of our God. All of this he does out of his love for us; it does not require and merit or worthiness on our behalf.

One day, at a time Jesus calls "soon," we will all be together in the presence of our God in a creation that is barely recognizable to the one we inhabit today. And we will live life as it was meant to be lived. And what we believe now by faith will be a dim shadow compared to the exceeding glory that our Lord will reveal to us in that day, and that we will enjoy for all eternity. Until then, the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all!

A Call to Waconia

"The report of my death was an exaggeration," Mark Twain wrote in response to an article that portrayed him dying of poverty in London, England. Over the last several weeks, I have had several people speculate about the reason why I have accepted a Call to Trinity in Waconia, MN. I offer the following explanation to provide clarity and to help you better understand how at least one Pastor understands the Call and the Call Process, as you will begin the process for St. Paul in the coming months. Let me begin by saying that you are in good hands with Pastor Coop. I have enjoyed working with him (and all the staff) immensely, and trust that our friendship will survive the almost 4-hour distance between here and Waconia, as I am that it will for many of you as well.

About six months ago, I went to the District Office and told President Turner that it was difficult for me to do my job. As Senior Pastor, I wear one hat that says "Leader" and another that says "Pastor." One of the tasks of my role as a leader is to recruit godly people to serve in leadership positions in the church. Over the last several years, a number of those who served in leadership dropped out or, at the end of their term, said "no" to future exposure to leadership positions at St. Paul. More than a few told me it was because of how they were treated by other members at St. Paul. Several have left the church over how they were treated. And so this presented me with a predicament: as a leader in the church, I should try to recruit good, godly leaders for leadership positions in the church. But as a Pastor in the church, I need to look out for the spiritual well-being of the members of the church. These two roles (Leader and Pastor) were in tension over whether I should try to recruit people to leadership positions in the church. And so I went to the District and told President Turner that I could not do my job as a leader in the church; I could not, in good conscience, encourage people to consider leadership positions in the church because I saw how serving in leadership had not been a good faith experience for quite a few people.

Shortly thereafter, I started being approached by congregations who were looking to call a Pastor. One of those congregations was Trinity, Waconia, who ended up extending me a Call. When a church "calls" a man to become their Pastor, they are saying, "we believe God wants you to become our Pastor." And so when a Pastor receives a Call from another congregation, he must determine whether that congregation is right—that God wants him to become the Pastor of that church. Other things might make the accepting or returning of that call a positive or negative for him and his family, but to discern the Call is nothing more than answering: is the Calling Congregation right? Does God want me to become their Pastor?

At the end of the day, I cannot think of a reason why Trinity is wrong in saying God wants me to become their next Senior Pastor. While I had thought God would have brought our family to Ankeny for more than four and a half years; and while there is always ministry and mission to be done, fellowship to have, and friendships to enjoy, we believe he is calling us to Trinity in Waconia. I hope this helps explain a little bit more about the Call Process, and the heart our family has for so many of you, and our desire to follow what we believe is God's call.

February Council Meeting Minutes

Gary called the meeting to order at 6:36 pm. In attendance:Tim Krehbiel, Pr. Coop, Dean Miller, Malisa Davies, Cindy Twedt, Bob Peters, Alyssa Wendzel, Ben Piepho, Gary Lohmann. Pr. Coop lead a devotion, and led in prayer. How have we been blessed? No responses. Approval of January minutes, moved by Lynn, seconded by Tim. Approved.

DCE Call: Jon Jero spoke to the status of the DCE call. The committee met last week and voted to call Jessica Blocker as our new DCE. Ben asked for qualities of the candidate. Jon spoke to her creativity, especially during Covid, her love of working with children, organization and writing skills. Overall, a very solid candidate to call. Lynn asked what the next step is. Gary indicated the next step would be to hold a special voters meeting slated for Feb. 28. The constitution requires a one week notice to voters. Information on the candidate will be compiled and provided to the voters prior to the voters meeting for review. Planning on utilizing a similar meeting style as we did in November for the last voter's meeting to social distance. Will be Zooming and holding in-person. Alyssa W. asked Jon questions about the candidate. Jon said the committee did not see concerns. Cindy and Malisa also spoke to the quality of the candidate. Jon stated that references were also contacted and Jessica's references were all very positive and the other candidate had some less than positive feedback. Gary identified the importance to get the call papers ready. Gary asked for a vote to approve presenting to the voters the recommendations from the DCE committee and schedule the meeting on Feb 28. Cindy motioned, Malisa seconded. Alyssa voted no, all other council members voted yes. Motion passed.

Update on Sudanese Congregation: Dennis Shaltanis provided history of its existence. They initially located at Trinity in Des Moines. They came to faith through Presbyterian missionaries back in Africa. When they relocated to the US, they had little with them except their Bibles. The congregation elected Simon Yeich to study the faith and become ordained as their minister. In October 2020, Pr. Simon lost his battle with cancer and the congregation found themselves without a minister. Elder, James Both, has offered to assume the role after he has been trained through the EIIT program of the LCMS, with guidance from McLellan. Dennis is asking Council and the congregation of St. Paul to financially support Jamesin his training. The cost will be split 3 ways between the IDW, Seminary and the congregation. The Sudanese are not financially capable to support James, so Dennis is asking for St. Paul's assistance. They can't afford to pay a pastor. Pr. Simon did not receive a salary. He supported his family by taking odd jobs. Dennis is proposing: "St. Paul supports this education for James by establishing a fund and encouraging members to consider contributing to this fund during the two years (four semesters) of James' education. Individuals nd organizations in the church could participate; contributions could be made by the "Designated Offering" envelope, or placed in the offerings in a plain envelope with your contributor number noted. The total needed contributions by St. Paul for the two years of this program will be an estimated \$8,800. All gifts would be tax deductible. This would be a great mission goal and opportunity for St. Paul." Bob Peters offered a motion, "I move that we approve a congregational fund raising effort for the Sudanese Ministry to provide financial support for their Elder, James Both, in his vicarage through Concordia Seminary St. Louis, as a participant in its (EIIT)* program. Concordia Seminary & Iowa District West are also helping finance James' education so he is able to be a Minister to the Sudanese Congregation The goal of this effort is to raise a minimum of \$4,000 for the first year of his two year program. If we exceed that goal, the extra funds would initially be applied to his second year of the program and then to other financial needs of the Sundanese Congregation. *Ethnic Immigrant Institute Training." Ben seconded the motion. Tim asked if it would make sense to amend the motion to a restricted fund to support the Sudanese Congregation beyond the timeframe asked for. Gary said yes, but would like to get us started with the initial fundraising and then once we've met this monetary goal, then change it to a restricted fund. Voted on motion. All approved. Bob also offered a second motion which read, "I move to approve James Both as the responsible member of the Sudanese Congregation for the use of the St. Paul facility in that he will secure the facility during and at the completion of the Sudanese services." Tim seconded. Gary explained this would keep us in line with our Facilities Use Policy. Pr. Coop asked if James had knowledge of how to lock the doors? Dennis wasn't sure but would ask that and train him if needed. Voted on second motion. All approved.

Senior Pastor Report: Absent. Report in Dropbox.

Associate Pastor Report: Full report in Dropbox, but some highlights are we will be using the big cross that was used in the Narthex a few years ago for names of people we pray for. Also, bought 200 Gospel of Matthew books to be handed out to people we invite to join us in service, or who just do not know Jesus. Also, please consider the DCE call and the McLellan's in your prayers.

Gary asked for a motion to accept staff reports. Malisa motioned. Ben seconded. Approved.

Elders Report: Full report in Dropbox. Bob mentioned during the last meeting they discussed goals for elders. Membership changes have been updated in Dropbox for review. Those changes are: received, Mark and Barb Lauthen, Yvonne McLellan, Calvin Uhlig, Ken Wise, the Thomas family and the Fairchild family; deaths, Jerold Johnson and Lois Oster; baptism, Luke McLellan. Lynn pointed out it should be Ken Kise, not Ken Wise in the report. Bob will make the change.

<u>Treasurer Report</u>: Dean reported that the outsourcing company is still working on January financials. He also reminded the council that in December we voted to bring to the voters a restricted fund for the music ministry.

Can we bring that to a vote in the special meeting on Feb. 28? Gary answered, yes. Ben asked if the financial reports would be available prior to the Feb. 28 voters meeting? Dean replied, yes. Malisa asked if they will always be delayed? Dean will work with the company to get them in a timely manner. Gary asked for approval of council reports. Tim motioned to approve. Lynn seconded. Approved.

Education Report: Full report in dropbox. Cindy stated Children's Church and Midweek continue as they have, but plan for Midweek to go weekly after spring break. Education discussed goals for 1, 3 & 5 years. Noted goals include hiring a DCE, getting programs back to normal, and planning/fundraising for an Ed wing. Alyssa asked what the Ed wing was? Cindy explained Ed still needs space and since we're not buying land in the near future we would like to re-start the conversation about adding an education wing again as part of our goals to add classrooms somewhere.

Evangelism Report: Full report in dropbox. Lynn commented that she had heard from a few new people that St. Paul wasn't that friendly of an environment, and said we need to do better. She asked that people reach out to

new faces and be more welcoming. She also asked if we were reaching out to people who haven't been coming? Ben asked if we should do another call-a-thon? Bob said elders can discuss again. Cindy added to Lynn's comment by saying she believed the turning point was when we stopped ushering out. When we ushered out, we could turn around and talk to new faces, and connect with fellow members. Now we see who can be the first ones out of the sanctuary. And it's only gotten worse with COVID. Tim and Lynn both said yes, and to let them know when it will be.

Gary clarified his statement last month when he asked Council to call members they haven't seen for a while. Council should be reaching out outside a phone-a-thon.

Finance Report: Kaleb was absent. No report.

<u>Property Report</u>: Jim couldn't make the meeting, but told Gary the classroom partition should be installed in a few weeks. Tim stated lights are in and look really nice.

Stewardship Report: No report yet, meeting was just last night. Tim stated it was a good meeting; discussed goals with Amber, planning member. Will be presented at the voters meeting in May. Bob mentioned one of the comments he got was how do we make goals for the next chair/board if we only have 2 year terms? Ben said to think of it as if it is your goal, to take ownership and pave that way for the next chair/board to work from. Gary handed out a paper comparing membership at St. Paul vs. Ankeny's growing population. He said as you are formulating goals, keep in mind how to accomplish these goals here at 1100 SE Sharon because as of now the purchase of land is not in the future. Look at how you can accomplish these goals here. Table showed we are basically a non-growing congregation for the last 10 years and membership is still declining. Some of those are explainable, such as the start of the Gate, and pandemic, but this is not an issue for the pastors to fix. What can WE do to turn this around? Again, Lynn touched on the fact that we're not friendly. We need to change that. We need to work on how to get people involved and keep people developed to step into leadership roles. Reach out to people in the congregation and make them feel valuable.

New Business

Nominating Committee: Gary is appointing Ben, as chair, and Bob Peters and Tim Krehbiel as committee members. Gary recommended Amber Giese as the 4th member. Motion to add Amber to the committee by Ben, seconded by Dean. Approved.
