INTRODUCTION TO SPIRITUAL FORMATION, MS-201-M

Ministerial Studies [3 credits] Summer 2019, Christian Life College - Madison

I. INSTRUCTORS

II. SCHEDULE

Although *Introduction to Spiritual Formation* is an independent study course, there is a course schedule that students must follow in order to better insure spiritual growth and academic success. Please see the course schedule at the end of this syllabus for complete details.

III. DESCRIPTION

This course has been designed to provide a biblical, theological and experiential foundation for the process of being conformed to the image of Christ. It will explore the meaning of biblical Christianity and its relation to faith and practice, giving special attention to spiritual formation through prayer, devotional reading, contemplation, and other spiritual disciplines. The lectures will help the student form a paradigm for spiritual growth and maturity that will affect both the individual and those to whom they minister.

IV. OBJECTIVES

- A. To assist students in developing a functional definition of spiritual formation.
- B. To give a broader understanding of how Christians grow spiritually.
- C. To foster a growing desire for knowing, serving and growing deep in God.
- D. To assist students in identifying and practicing key spiritual disciplines.
- E. To help students in developing a greater desire for spiritual growth in themselves and others.
- F. To support students in their own spiritual growth through course exercises and assignments.
- G. To convey methods, tools and understanding with which students can assist others in growing spiritually.

VI. REQUIREMENTS

- A. Lectures and Notes. Students are required to take copious and cogent notes on all twelve lectures. Notes are to be submitted weekly according to the class schedule. Notes may *not* be handwritten. Notes be typed in Times New Roman, 12pt. font.
- B. Reading and Responses. Students will be expected to complete all required reading and the corresponding responses according to the class schedule. A statement of the amount of required reading completed thoughtfully and carefully (i.e. 80%, 90%, etc.) followed by the reading responses will fulfill this requirement. Most of the questions/statements for response can be found at the end of the corresponding chapter in each textbook. The questions/statements for Foster can be found in the Celebration of Discipline Study Guide. All questions/statements and corresponding responses must be typed in Times New Roman, 12pt. font.
- C. Schedule and Punctuality. Because spiritual growth is seldom achieved in a rush of activity, students will be required to submit assignments according to the weekly class schedule. Late assignments will *not* receive a reduced grade. However, students are encouraged to stay on schedule as credit will *not* be given to any assignment submitted more than fourteen days late.
