At a Meeting of the Committee of the American Tract Society,
held at their Room, No. 144 Nassau-street, New-York, July 7, 1829
a letter was read from Mr. A. Granger, Jr. for Mr. William J. Annin,

~~Secretary of the~~ Auxiliary Tract Society of Liberty Corner,
in Baskenridge, N. Y. announcing its formation, and giving
notice of the plan of the Constitution adopted, and the Officers elected.

My Dear Sir,

Our Committee are truly gratified and encouraged in having reported to them the Auxiliary with which you are connected and ardently pray that the blessing of God may rest on your efforts which we trust have been commenced and will be continued with a desire to promote his glory. There are great encouragements for us to labor in this important and interesting branch of Christian benevolence, as we have the most abundant evidence that the publications issued by the Society have been signally blessed by the Holy Spirit to the conversion of very many souls. In the American Tract Magazine which is forwarded your Auxiliary gratis will be found some most encouraging facts, of recent occurrence which have come to our knowledge through the medium of the monthly distribution of Tracts in this city. To the system last referred to we invite the attention of your Society. Let the portion of the field of labor embraced by you be divided into small districts assigning to each an active friend of the cause who shall visit the same once a month making known to every family the character of the Tracts and inviting each to accept of a copy of the one you may select for the month.
