FROM YOUR MINISTER JIMMY READER

Thank you for your generous gift to us! With the COVID delay in a Christmas gift, we received it this past week, and Joy and I greatly appreciate your love and care for us expressed by this gift. We will use it to continue to prepare an anticipated vacation immediately following retirement. We have a wedding – the first for one of our 37 grandchildren – in Kansas and then expect to visit family and friends throughout the Midwest.



Less than 14 weeks to go for my retirement and the ending of my pastoral relationship with you. The end of May will be one month shy of 8 years at the United Church of Pittsford. We have had challenges and celebrations, losses and sadness, and many good times together. Over the next couple of months, we will remember our accomplishments and successes together – and celebrate them! ... For now, please mark your calendars for **Sunday, May 16**, which will be my last Sunday with you.

Meanwhile ... a pastor search committee has begun to meet. They will work with Rev. Vonda Fossitt, UMC district superintendent, and Rev. Sandra Hasenauer, ABC executive minister to help guide their search for a candidate for your next pastor. Their process will be transparent, and they will keep you posted on their progress. Who they are contacting and talking to, of course, will be entirely confidential when that time comes. The committee includes Scott Hanson, chair; Fred Peckham, Logan Hazen, Nate Schunk, Briana Hanson, Anne Passmore, and Katie Zink.

My focus as your pastor for these remaining weeks, besides leading worship and responding to pastoral concerns, will be to work with the Council to help the congregation get organized for effective work together under our new structure. Council members provide leadership for the church and oversee the various parts of church life and ministry. The work of the church will be done by small teams and individuals appointed by the Council. I will work with the Council to identify and recruit people for all that needs to be done and help you move into this next phase of your life as a congregation.

What about meeting in person? New cases and the "positivity rate" have been declining and are now at their lowest point since November 3. We are already well below the levels which forced us to stop in-person services before Thanksgiving. Assuming the decline continues, we may begin Sunday services in the sanctuary again in March. We will let you know after the Council meets next week. Many of you did not feel comfortable coming to in-person services before and may not again until this is "over." So we are planning to combine video recording of our services with providing a Zoom link so you can participate in the services in the sanctuary as they are happening. We will let you know the details when the time comes.

Digital ministry will be the "new normal" for churches everywhere, even after the pandemic is over. Livestreaming services so people could join the service virtually on TV, computer, or phone has been happening for years at large churches. Now small congregations like ours are able to do the same. We have a church app and integrated website where videos have been uploaded. That same platform allows us to livestream the services and have the recording automatically available for viewing later. We are having that discussion now about whether to begin it. ... For five years, we have been involved with our multimedia project - installing a state-of-the-art sound system in both the sanctuary and Howard Hall. We added smart TVs in Howard Hall, the lounge, and the youth room upstairs to enhance our ministry. We have now added a camera and accessories to be able to continue recording our services on video - and other events in the sanctuary as well. I hope we can complete the final part of this project by May - installing large screens in the sanctuary (which can lay flat against the wall) and other hardware to be able to use photos, graphics, videos, words to scripture and hymns - as we have been doing on Zoom. Digital ministry is the "new normal" for churches everywhere, and I hope that UCP can more fully move in that direction.

I am looking forward to these final three months with you and anticipating all the good things we can yet do together. May God bless us all.
