Our power and authority is supported by the Spirit's indwelling within us and He will impart the very wisdom of the Father! Don't get misguided by someone's opinion, just grab hold and do what the Bible teaches us to do. The Spirit of Truth IS the truth!!!

And I fell to the ground and heard a voice saying to me, 'Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting me?' And I answered, 'Who are you, Lord?' And he said to me, 'I am Jesus of Nazareth, whom you are persecuting.'

Acts 22: 7-8

Along with her work with the Surf Project, Lily also writes devotionals for the local Methodist Churches on the North Coast of Northern Ireland. This devotional is the 2nd of a 3 part series on Paul.

Read: Acts 22:12-16

Ananias is one of the most important people in the Bible, despite the fact that he is only mentioned twice in the whole bible. I know that is bold claim, but without him, Paul probably never would have become a Christian and journeyed all over the Greco-Roman world spreading the Gospel. Paul's encounter with Christ on the road would have not changed much if he hadn't then met Ananias. Ananias didn't want to go meet Saul, he knew who Saul was and what he was coming to Damascus to do. Ananias would probably have been killed if Saul had carried out his original mission. But Ananias was obedient and went to Paul and helped him make sense of what happened on the road. The miracle of Christ appearing to Saul is amazing, extraordinary but Jesus' miracles always have a second component beyond the initial healing or bright moment, He also always restores them to community. Even for Paul He sends Ananias to help introduce Paul to the early church community. Jesus doesn't just perform a miracle and then walk away, He stays in their lives, in spirit, through other people, and because He continues a relationship with us.

I believe in an active God, who is always pursuing us and loving us, sometimes He uses us and other people to impact other's lives. You may not realize that God is working through you, just like He worked through Ananias with Paul. God doesn't always use big shining bolts of light He also connects with us through ordinary people. God works through us all the time; we may not even realize it. You never know how God might work through you to encourage someone, or to speak light into their lives. We need to be open and paying attention to how God might be nudging us and obedient like Ananias because without ordinary people like you and me being Christ's church then we become the barriers to God's Kingdom here on earth. It seems extreme but if we aren't living in the Spirit and following His lead, we might miss what God is doing all around us. So, I encourage you to be like Ananias, because who know you might just encourage someone as influential as Paul.

Prayer:

Dear Heavenly Father thank you for sending people into our lives to do your work. You are an amazing God who wants a relationship with us and wants us to live in community with each other. Thank you God, for sending Your spirit to work in us to bring Your Kingdom here. You have entrusted us to be Your church Lord, give us the strength to follow where you lead. In your name we pray. Amen.

Nov. 29th Making Room for OTHERS

The light was in the world, and the world came into being through the light, but the world didn't recognize the light. The light came to his own people, and his own people didn't welcome him. But those who did welcome him, those who believed in his name, he authorized to become God's children. - John 1:10-12 CEB

Christmas is a time of welcome! The Christmas celebration Las Posadas comes from the Hispanic traditions of Latin American countries, especially Mexico. It dates back to the 16th century. Every evening from December 16-23, with a special service on Christmas Eve, those celebrating Las Posadas travel together to a predetermined place where they knock on the door of a darkened home to begin a liturgy. The community gathered outside asks for lodging in the voice of Joseph. "We have come exhausted from Nazareth," The people inside give a rational response, "We do not give lodging to strangers."Readings from Scripture follow until the people inside the home turn on the lights and invite the travelers to come inside. "Lodging we will give you with much happiness," they say, "enter, good Joseph; enter with Mary." When everyone is inside, it is time to celebrate!

Making room for Jesus includes making room for our neighbors. Jesus taught that what we do for others, we also do for him. What rituals will you go through to prepare for Christmas? How will you make room in your life in the days ahead? How will you reach out in love and service to your neighbors around the corner and around with world? How will you make room for others this Christmas?

Prayer: O God, open my eyes to see those with whom I can share your love this week. Amen.

Dec. 6th Making Room for HOPE

Mary said, "With all my heart I glorify the Lord! ...He has shown strength with his arm. He has scattered those with arrogant thoughts and proud inclinations. He has pulled the powerful down from their thrones and lifted up the lowly. He has filled the hungry with good things and sent the rich away empty-handed." — Luke 1:46, 51-53 CEB

At Christmas, we can lose focus on what is most important, thinking more about what we want than what we already have in Christ. In the United States this year, Amazon.com released its first-ever, print, toy catalog for Christmas. It even included stickers to help family members highlight the items they most want this year. We sometimes come to Christmas from a place of lack. We ask our kids what they want for Christmas and make wish lists of our own. We worry about having enough money to get everyone the gifts we've imagined they so desperately want.

We do all of this in celebration of the birth of Jesus, who had nearly nothing — not even a proper place to be born. Yet we proclaim this child to be King of Kings and Lord of Lords.

Clearly there is more to Christmas than the gifts we exchange. It is the gift we receive in Christ. The baby with "nothing" is the hope for the world. What do you want for Christmas? Where do you sense lack? How will you refocus your attention on the hope found in Jesus Christ? How will you make room for hope this Christmas?

Prayer: O God, refocus me on the hope I already have in Christ. Amen.

Dec. 13th Making Room for Peace

Nearby shepherds were living in the fields, guarding their sheep at night. The Lord's angel stood before them, the Lord's glory shone around them, and they were terrified. The angel said, "Don't be afraid! Look! I bring good news to you — wonderful, joyous news for all people. Your savior is born today in David's city. He is Christ the Lord. Luke 2:8-11 CEB

Christmas is busy! Even in the midst of a pandemic there is so much to do! The decorating needs to be done. Some of us will still prepare for the arrival of guests with deep cleaning. Shopping and baking will still happen. We wonder every year how we're going to fit it all in and this year, how to do it in a new way. But it's not this way only at Christmas time. Some of us live similarly the other 11 months of the year also. We expend so much energy going from here to there, accomplishing to-do list item A through to-do list item Z with little room to pause and ponder.

Maybe that's one of the reasons the shepherds were the first to hear about the birth of Jesus. They were "living in the fields, guarding their sheep at night." It must have been quieter with their flocks than it was with the crowds in town who'd arrived for the census.

In the midst of our busyness at Christmas and other times throughout the year, we need to take time for wonder, awe and peace. Have you been busy as you prepare for Christmas? How will you take time to go out to the fields and look up into the sky? How will you pause, process and give thanks for all that God is doing in and for you? How will you make room for peace this Christmas?

Prayer: O God, slow me down so that I might experience the wonder, awe and peace of Christmas. Amen.

Dec. 20th Making Room for Joy

Since Joseph belonged to David's house and family line, he went up from the city of Nazareth in Galilee to David's city, called Bethlehem, in Judea. He went to be enrolled together with Mary, who was promised to him in marriage and who was pregnant. — Luke 2:4-5 CEB

As Mary and Joseph traveled to his hometown, many of us go home for Christmas as well. We journey near and far to gather with family and friends, some of whom we may not see at any other time of year. For infrequent travelers, the idea of getting on an airplane or packing the car can seem overwhelming. Where is that suitcase? Is this too big to be a carry-on? Do we have everything the kids will need? How will we travel with the gifts we'll give and later return with the ones we'll receive? Many will over pack, only to realize later we didn't need to take everything with us. And this year, is it even safe for us to travel! Are we putting our family at risk.

In our everyday lives, we can also carry a lot of negative, emotional "baggage." Anger about that event long ago still travels with us. Hurt from a difficult relationship seems always nearby. Internal struggles about money, time, and other resources are held onto. We need to pack lighter. When we carry too much, we hinder our ability to receive.

Our hands must be empty to embrace the joy of Christ, to receive the love from our neighbors, friends and family. Do you tend to over pack? What might you leave behind? What good things have you missed because you were clutching onto something else? What negativity do you need to release? How will you make room for joy this Christmas?

Prayer: O God, grant me the strength and courage to carry less "baggage" this Christmas.

Dec. 25th Making Room for LOVE

A voice is crying out: "Clear the Lord's way in the desert! Make a level highway in the wilderness for our God! Every valley will be raised up, and every mountain and hill will be flattened. Uneven ground will become level, and rough terrain a valley plain. The Lord's glory will appear, and all humanity will see it together; the Lord's mouth has commanded it."

—Isaiah 40:3-5, CEB

While preparing for Christmas, many of us move things around to make room. The furniture is rearranged to make a place for the Christmas tree. Knick-knacks on a hearth or living room table are cleared to accommodate the Nativity set. Wall hangings are shuffled to provide a spot to display the Christmas cards we receive. The contents of the pantry, refrigerator and freezer are consolidated so there will be room for ingredients and special Christmas food. We clean out the extra bedroom to offer our guests. We may even prune some trees in the yard and clean the gutters to make space for Christmas decorations.

Advent is a time when we are comfortable moving things around to make room in our homes for Christmas. This makes sense. Christmas is about the birth of a child, and every parent knows what it is like to lovingly prepare their homes for the day the child arrives and changes their lives.

How will things be moved around in your home this Christmas? What needs to be rearranged in your life to make room for the Christ child? What changes will you make to carry Christ with you every day? How will you make room for love this Christmas?

Prayer: O God, show me how I can share the hope, peace, joy and love of Christmas with others. Amen.
