


A Fine Line Between Liberty & Idolatry

- Read 1 Corinthians 10:14-15 (NLT)

 So, my dear friends, flee from the worship of idols. You are reasonable people. Decide for yourselves if what I am saying is true.
 - What did idolatry mean to the Corinthian church?
 - What does idolatry mean today?
 - Have there been times in your life that you realized there was something you were obsessing over that was pulling your attention from God?
 - What does Paul's instruction to flee tell us about the dangerous nature of idols?





 Read Leviticus 3:1-5 & 7:31-34 (NLT) If you present an animal from the herd as a peace offering to the Lord , it may be a male or a female, but it must have no defects. Lay your hand on the animal's head, and slaughter it at the entrance of the Tabernacle. Then Aaron's sons, the priests, will splatter its blood against all sides of the altar. The priest must present part of this peace offering as a special gift to the Lord. This includes all the fat around the internal organs, the two kidneys and the fat around them near the loins, and the long lobe of the liver. These must be removed with the kidneys, and Aaron's sons will burn them on top of the burnt offering on




the wood burning on the altar. It is a special gift, a pleasing aroma to the Lord.

Then the priest will burn the fat on the altar, but the breast will belong to Aaron and his descendants. Give the right thigh of your peace offering to the priest as a gift.

- How were the Israelites united by giving sacrifices to God and celebrating with a meal?
- Eating a peace offering before the Lord was an act of worship. Is there an equivalent to this in the New Testament church?






- Read 1 Corinthians 10:16-18 (NLT)

 When we bless the cup at the Lord's


 Table, aren't we sharing in the blood
 of Christ? And when we break the
 bread, aren't we sharing in the body
 of Christ? And though we are many,
 we all eat from one loaf of bread,
 showing that we are one body. Think
 about the people of Israel. Weren't
 they united by eating the sacrifices at
 the altar?
 - The Lord's Supper is an act of worship. How does the Corinthian believers' denigration of it show their idolatry?





- Read 1 Corinthians 10:23-24 (NLT)
 You say, "I am allowed to do anything"
 —but not everything is good for you. You say, "I am allowed to do anything"—but not everything is beneficial. Don't be concerned for your own good but for the good of others.
 - How does something that was meant to be good turn into an idol in our lives that masters us?
 - What are some modern "good things" that have can become idols in our lives?





- Read 1 Corinthians 10:31-11:1 (NLT)
 So whether you eat or drink, or
 whatever you do, do it all for the glory
 of God. Don't give offense to Jews or
 Gentiles or the church of God. I, too,
 try to please everyone in everything I
 do. I don't just do what is best for me;
 I do what is best for others so that
 many may be saved. And you should
 imitate me, just as I imitate Christ.
 - How is it possible to do everything conscience of the presence of God?






Pastor David said:

- Read 2 Corinthians 13:5 (NLT)
 Examine yourselves to see if your faith is genuine. Test yourselves.
 Surely you know that Jesus Christ is among you; if not, you have failed the test of genuine faith.

- Check your emotions. What has the power to change your moods?
- Where do you spend your money?
- How do you spend your time? Is it an activity? A person/relationship?
