LIVE BOLDLY

"It's all over." Those were the words on the lips of the people of Jerusalem as they looked over the city walls at the Babylonian Army. With the invasion, they'd lost family members, their livelihood and their freedom.

But in the midst of the despair, a prophet named Jeremiah was led by God to buy a once productive field located far beyond the city gates, perilously behind enemy lines.

Why make such a seemingly foolish purchase? Because even in the midst of the heartache, God was working. He was inviting Jeremiah to invest in the future. "Yes, fields will once again be bought and sold—deeds signed and sealed and witnessed . . . The Lord said, . . . For someday I will restore prosperity to them. I, the Lord, have spoken!" Jeremiah 32:44

In the midst of generational adversity, God was at work preparing the future, and that future was a worthy investment.

I see so much of Jeremiah's experience in our world today. We're coming through a lifetime event with the pandemic and it's easy to fall victim to the tyranny of the moment.

But God has been working throughout the hardship. Now is the time to invest in the future He's prepared. God is calling us to plant and strengthen churches across north Florida and beyond, to train up a new generation of church leadership, engage a lost world with the Gospel, to love our neighbor in tangible ways, and He's calling us to prepare for the growth of our own congregation. To do so, we need to take bold steps in our discipleship, our ministry and our generosity.



Beginning back in 2016, Celebration began structuring its ministry around a two-year, comprehensive initiative. This initiative asked the simple question, "Where is God leading us over the next two years?" We prayerfully sought to answer this question by looking at what steps in discipleship, serving and giving we'd need to take collectively as a body as well as individually as Christ Followers. Christ has placed each one of us in a symbiotic relationship with our church. We can't go anywhere as a church if we're not growing as individual Christ Followers and we can't grow effectively as Christ Followers if our church isn't intentionally thriving. Here is a look at what we've accomplished in the last two years, and where we want to see our church grow.

CHILDREN'S MINISTRY

Prior to Covid, our ministry to children had grown so dramatically that we had to split Blast into K-2 and 3-5 groups to accommodate all the children coming to grow and learn.

Of course, 2020 changed everything. During lockdown, our children's ministry kicked into high-gear to continue to serve our families. Because of your giving, Celebration Kids was able to make weekly videos to teach children from toddlers through 5th grade about Jesus and the Bible and gift bags that were delivered to homes.

Now, we are excited about all the ministry that we can do post-Covid. Since returning to in-person worship, we've seen the number of children steadily grow. As part of a new church-wide discipleship plan, our Children's Ministry has begun writing their own curriculum for Sunday mornings. This is allowing them to tie what the children are learning in BLAST to what their parents are learning in the Worship Service and providing tools for parents to better disciple their children at home.

STUDENT MINISTRY

Nationwide, kids who grew up in the church are turning away from their faith in record numbers. Celebration is dedicated to turning the tide of this trend.

Celebration made the decision to invest in the future of our students by hiring a Girl's Ministry Director to serve alongside Pastor Aaron Sheffield. Kaitlin Harper now fills this position and is serving with passion to see the young women of Celebration invest in their own faith everyday.

When Covid struck in 2020, Celebration Students began making videos so our students could continue to learn and grow together. Zoom Hangouts became a weekly event to keep the students connected to each other.

Now that Covid is passing, we are looking excitedly to the future. This year, Celebration is partnering with over 20 churches for United Weekend (Dnow) and looks forward to partnering with many more in the years to come. These churches will be working together throughout the year through United Nights to help our students see the connectedness of the Body of Christ and know they aren't alone as believers in their schools. We will be offering many new opportunities for students to grow in faith and leadership over the summer of 2021 and beyond.

ADULT MINISTRY

Groups ministry is built on connecting people to grow in their faith together. Covid lockdowns made those connections difficult.

Group leaders took a crash course in technology and took their classes online. Home groups sprung up of people that were quarantining together. Both allowed discipleship to continue and showed us exciting ways for us to move forward.

In the Fall of 2020, we piloted Conversation Groups- small groups gathering to do a Bible study based on Sunday's message. Volunteers gathers each week to write a personalized study just for Celebration and our video team creates a series of videos to support the message. Our goal over the next two years is to launch 40 new Conversation Groups in homes.

T-Groups are an essential part of the discipleship journey here at Celebration. These small groups of three to four people provide accountability and training for believers as they grow to be more like Jesus. Since 2011, we have had 730 people go through a T-Group and currently we have 77 people participating. By 2023, we want to see 90 T-Groups meeting at once at Celebration- that would be more than 270 people engaged in active discipleship!

One part of Group life that has survived and thrived is our Wednesday night and Weekday Training Groups. We have been able to train believers in important areas: marriage, parenting, Bible knowledge, prophecy, gender and sexual identity issues, spiritual warfare, spiritual and physical health, authentic manhood, prayer, finances and much more! In the next two years we want to strategically mature disciples each semester with 16 Training Groups by May 2022: and 24 by May 2023.

WORSHIP MINISTRY

Celebration has been live streaming worship services since 2017 but with Covid, we had to take our game to a whole new level. As church went online only, our Worship and Tech teams made it possible for us all to continue to worship and learn together- even while we were physically apart.

Then we were able to purchase airtime on Fox49, which meant we now needed to produce a weekly television broadcast along with all of our regular live streams and videos. We saw the Lord's provision at work in the hiring of our first full-time




The Celebration Tech Team overseeing filming of the Tallahassee Christmas Eve special. Broadcast on Fox49, this special reached over 26,000 households.

videographer, Jessica McNeil. Jessica and her growing team film our Sunday services every week, Live stream every Sunday and then edit it for our Fox49 broadcast- now reaching more than 4,000 every week!

MISSIONS

Tallahassee is home to over 25,000 native Spanish speakers. In 2019 we launched a Spanishlanguage Worship Service-Celebration En Español- with Pastor John Lizarazo. CEE has grown greatly over their first year and are now meeting in the Loft at 1:15pm on Sundays. Over the next two years, we will be fully integrating CEE into the life of Celebration.

property along Centerville Road formerly known as Woodland Hall. That building has now been converted into the Mission Training Center. Pastor Scott Carter has been hard at work building partnerships that will help Celebration become a reproducing church. We will partner with the North American Mission Board, the Florida Baptist Convention and the Florida Baptist Associate to host a cohort of church planters at the Mission Training Center.

Your gifts during Live Boldly will also be used to develop an online campus. We will then be able to develop our online and TV viewers into groups all over the Greater North Florida region.

The Celebration family has been hard at work serving our local community too. Through backpack drives, Season of Compassion, food distribution, our benevolence ministry and more, our church family has provided basic needs for hundreds of families.

It's exciting to be a part of a church body that regularly enjoys seeing God at work, but our body can't grow if you're not on your own spiritual journey. Each one of us needs to take personal steps to grow

JIM'S LIVE BOLDLY STORY

Jim Moller has served as the a Group Leader for the Next Chapter Group for many years. When Covid lock downs began in March of 2020, he faced a new challenge. Jim shared, "Our plan was built around us coming to Sunday School and sharing there. But those techniques really weren't working... with the church closing for a period of time as a result of the COVID-19, we had to change our plan a little bit." With the help of Pastor Doug Bedgood and his assistant, Jerri Chesney, Jim and his group were soon able to meet online via Zoom.

"The one thing I really learned from it is each and every one of us are going through something in our life," Jim said. "Some things are more important than others, but everybody has something that is going on. And what happens is it makes it easy then to talk to that person because you know more than, 'Hey, my name is Jim,' but I actually know more about that person.

"You know, we're an older group, and so initially technology kind of whipped on some of us. But we powered our way through it. We've now learned how to Zoom, how to share screens, how to interact with others. And I think just seeing everyone's face brings joy to us. I have to laugh before we start the official start of the class. Each of us, you know, gets to go around and say hello and stuff. You know, people hold up their dogs. And at first I thought, 'That's kind of crazy.' But you know what, it's not. It's adding the human element to communication."

What started as an emergency move online is showing us what the future could hold. Pastor Doug said, "Every time God's people were restricted or limited in how they could meet, the kingdom of God grew."

Celebration is excited to see how God uses this technology to continue to grow his kingdom. "I'd like to see our group ministry continue to grow in the online community because that to me, is a new frontier and a new way that we can continue to do that," said Pastor Doug.

Upside Down

Though he was young and fresh out of seminary, Lawton looked the part as the new leader of the burgeoning youth group. Lawton did a lot for me in those formative years as a teenager. It was what he did not do for me, however, that made the greatest impact. As any good Youth Pastor would do, he engaged us in a busy Youth program with all the bells and whistles. Lawton took us on annual Mission/Choir Trips to places around the country. We even went to an old castle in England for an international Youth conference. We loved Lawton and his charisma and passion, but I sensed I was missing something.

Then my world turned upside down; literally I found myself upside down in my car that had just flipped. With the engine still racing and gas fumes building; I crawled out, with adrenaline pumping, unaware of the amount of skin and muscle I had lost on my arm. I killed the engine and then looked up and said, "God wanted me to preach, and I said, 'No.'" In that moment, the wall of denial of God's call on my life crumbled. My pride and self-determination took a big blow, and complete surrender to His will and ways took over.

Lawton was helpful in steering me in my call to the ministry. However, what was missing? Why were we, as a church, so busy, but not practicing what Jesus commanded? Seeking God's way set me on a journey to move beyond programs to authentic relationships with God and those people He has placed in my path.

Take a personal inventory of how much you have fallen into the trap of emphasizing church activity over a vital relationship with your Creator and disciple making relationships with others.

Ask God to reveal to you greater ways to love Him and greater ways to love your neighbor.

Paul Johnson was an intimidating figure, He had red hair, large build and a way of smiling one minute and then the next venting his anger to exert his control. Paul, also, was the Chairman of the Board of Deacons at the first church I served at after seminary. Being "called on the carpet" at a Deacons' meeting to reveal who I was talking to about teaching our Senior Adults did not seem like a big issue, except that I had promised confidentiality to the person who was considering taking the role.

When I caved into the threats and angry tones, it totally took me off guard and I blurted out the name.

Thankfully, nothing negative really came out of it, but I felt I violated a trust. The gift of understanding came as I recognized the lack of spiritual depth among most church leaders. Most had roles because of their skills, abilities and success in the business world. Almost to a person, none was actively growing in relationship with God and others. They lacked the fruit: making disciples – the prime directive of Christ.

How can spiritual immaturity derail or distract church leaders from the prime directive of making disciples?

Whatever your role in the church, are you a growing disciple who is in discipling relationships?

In Kentucky, I find myself alone, sitting on the cold, hard railroad tracks under a starlit sky, crying out to God in frustration. Ironically, what drove me to this was being awakened by the smell of sweaty men and the cavalcade of snoring that reminded me of a steam train! It was our annual mission trip to build a church building. I wrestled with why a good thing (building a church building) was keeping us from the best thing (building a spiritual family).

In Ethiopia, the rich aroma of freshly made coffee was the only thing familiar as I sat in the crude church building made of eucalyptus logs and a thatch roof. Several hundred young, eager church leaders sat on log benches no more than six inches wide for three hours to hear us teach how to

use New Testament stories to teach their congregations how to be the church and carry out the command of Christ to make disciples who make disciples.

How focused are you in fulfilling the command of Christ to make disciples, who make disciples?

Ask God to bring to mind those He has placed in your world that you need to be in a discipling relationship with. Then prayerfully obey!

Before I took my first youth pastor job, my wife Allyson and I decided to attend services and join a Sunday school class at the church that I had applied to. 

So at 23 years old, I found myself making a career change, and I landed in the City-State of Singapore, where I served as the youth pastor at International Baptist Church of Singapore for two years. Singapore is a fascinating country, very multi-cultural; a crossroads of Asia and the world. These couple of years afforded me the opportunity to travel all over Asia and experience different countries and cultures. Absolutely the best thing I could have done with these two years of my life.

One time in particular, I was sitting on a bench one morning at the Baptist camp in Port Dickson, Malaysia overlooking the Straits of Melaka, the body of water separating Peninsular Malaysia and the Indonesian island of Sumatra. 

Fast forward 15 years and our family was living and serving in Malaysia planting churches. One of the groups we started early in our time there was a house church group in our neighborhood area. It was a very surreal moment that I will never forget. During our years of church planting in Malaysia, we had the privilege of baptizing people from all over the world.

The phone call came and I learned I had been assigned to a small church in Waterloo, lowa, in a very unchurched area.

I packed my bags, bought some cold weather clothes, and took my very first airplane ride from Oklahoma City to Waterloo, IA. We had one layover and my second flight was a very small passenger plane. The kind where you can see the pilot and there were only about 8 people on the plane. We flew through a snow storm and I quickly discovered why the little white baggie was placed in the seat pocket in front of me. Let's just say I filled up the bag and praised God when we finally landed. I would have kissed the ground when I got off, but there was about two feet of snow. The guy who picked me up was a friend of one the church members and was chosen because he had a big truck that could safely deliver me back to the church. I would only see him one more time in the next five months. But I was glad that I had answered the call and I was ready to serve in whatever I was asked to do.

Have you ever thought about short term missions? Taking a mission trip? What would you say that God is calling you to do to answer the "call?"

My friends back home wondered how I would make ends meet and if serving like this would be worth it. I was paid \$60 per week and was supposed to be provided food and lodging. I ended up living in the church. They set up a bed in one of the Sunday school rooms, brought me weekly groceries, and I had access to the baptistery as my personal bathtub. I'm happy to admit that I never bathed in the baptistery, I ended up getting a gym membership at the local YMCA and that is where I took my daily showers.

My first Sunday we only had five people and it was about 5 degrees outside. I would discover that this was the average attendance and temperature at Waterloo Baptist Church. I led the worship, the pastor preached, we had a paid pianist, and then one couple, David and Carolyn Newcomb. We sang, took an offering, and the preacher preached. It was like being in the twilight zone. During my time I would serve as the worship leader, youth and children's pastor, and the janitor. David and Carolyn were more than a blessing to me and took me to the local buffet every Sunday to make sure I was being fed well.

After Iowa I was moved to Charleston, SC and San Diego, CA. I ended my third year serving with a traveling creative arts mission team based out of Atlanta. With Missions USA we lived on the road for one year driving from event to event and just about every day did shows at churches, colleges, schools, and anywhere that would have us. We spread the word about missions and encouraged people to sign up for mission opportunities.

I can honestly say that God more than provided for my needs during these years. I slept on couches, hotels, host homes, and even churches. There was always food to eat, a little money in my pocket, and I never really lacked for any basic needs. It was time spent trusting God for my daily provisions and meeting people that would change my life from one journey to the next.





I started out self-employed. A young musician is not often burdened with the responsibility of income. It was fairly easy, therefore, to skirt over the issue of giving for me. My pay was always irregular, and never for sure, so my pattern of giving was inconsistent.

Then I began my first full-time Music Pastor job. Ten percent of the pastor's salaries were deducted and given to the local denomination as a matter of policy in this church. I didn't have a choice but to become a tither. In some ways, this was good for me and good for the body of Christ. It wasn't, however, developmental in my understanding and heart toward giving.

As I moved from that position, I was then in the more common position of receiving all of my net pay and consequently faced the responsibility of tithing 10% plus giving. While I had a heart to give, the reality of a low bank account balance and a growing family often overcame my good intentions. At times, I built up a rather hefty amount of money owed to God. Over the years, I was constantly trying to pay the tithe that I owed.

Then, in the midst of my research into generosity, I made a strategic decision. I would go back to something that had worked quite well for me. I arranged for my giving to be automatically deducted from my salary each paycheck. This time, however, it was not forced upon me. It was my intention to make sure that my heart to be generous toward God not be thwarted by unforeseen expenses. The decision to automatically pay my tithe first brings me great joy. This way I know that the first fruits of my income are His and in the hands of His church before I could even think of spending it on a dishwasher or on Disney.

I still have plenty of room for growth and do earnestly look forward to following God's direction in taking new bold steps in generous giving. Are there steps toward habitual giving that you could take? Take a few minutes to pray for the courage to take bold steps toward becoming the kind of giver that doesn't find themselves "behind" in their obligations toward God.


Trusting the Supplier







MY BOLD STEPS: GIVING



PRACTICAL STRATEGIES TO FOLLOW

PRACTICE PRIORITY BUDGETING

Many families may choose to rearrange their financial priorities. By identifying "unnecessary or less important" expenses that are currently in the budget, the family may free up funds that can become part of their giving goal.

REDIRECT PRESENT EXPENDITURES

Some families have short-term expenditures or loans that will soon be settled. Once these expenses are paid off, the funds, which are already a part of the Budget, can be redirected to Live Boldly.

INCREASE GIVING WITH INCREASED INCOME

Sometimes a family may be aware of an expected bonus or an upcoming increase in income. These families can choose to plan to include these increases in income in their total goal.

DONATE ASSETS

Some families may have stocks, bonds, or other securities that have appreciated. These assets can be included in their goal. There are potential tax advantages to this type of transaction, but there are also potential penalties. Therefore, before making a contribution of this type, we encourage you to consult your CPA, tax attorney, or financial advisor.



5- WALK BY FAITH

Set your goal and trust God to help you successfully fulfill it.

CREATIVE IDEAS

- Sell some collectibles that you've had for a while.
- Consider simpler vacation or remodeling plans.
- Consider using overtime pay to increase your contribution.
- Turn a hobby into a source of revenue.
- Consider taking a fast from expensive coffees, sweets, or dining out.
- Take Financial Peace University or another financial education course.

INVESTING IN THE FUTURE

In just a few short years Celebration Baptist Church has seen God move in tremendous ways. Lives changed, commitments made, the gospel shared, people fed and a new church planted. God has so much more in store for us in our new ministry initiative, Live Boldly.

In Live Boldly we will continue the expanded ministries begun in Focus 2020 and begin preparing for the next steps in our journey as a church family.

We're on the doorstep of the largest housing expansion in Tallahassee since the construction of Southwood, the Welaunee Expansion. Our church is about to be located in between two huge neighborhoods, each with thousands of homes.

When we were developing Focus 2020, we saw this coming so we laid the foundation for a new worship center when we purchased Woodland Hall. When God made a way for us to buy Woodland Hall, He opened the door for us to invest in our own future in a way that the church has dreamed of for nearly 40 years. The three acres included in that purchase make it possible for us to build a new worship center that will face the intersection of Centerville and Killearn.

This new worship center will give us capacity for just under 1100 people in worship, almost double our current capacity. We'll also be adding much needed parking so our campus may accommodate a larger capacity in worship. It will allow us to prepare for the additional growth we'll experience as our new neighbors move in.



This is a huge challenge for us, because it is so easy to be swept up in the tyranny of the moment. It's so easy to look around at our worship center and see the social distancing, see the masks all the while knowing that there are a number of people that haven't been to church since the pandemic began a year ago.

But we need to remember that this won't last forever. We're seeing our church family and guests return to church. I am convinced that God has a future for us. I am convinced that we'll go far beyond anywhere we've ever been before.

This construction will help the whole church. When we have that new space, we'll be able to upgrade our worship center to better serve our student ministry on Wednesday nights. We'll also use that space as the new home for Celebration en Español on Sunday mornings.

The majority of the Live Boldly ministry plan will be focused on continuing our current ministries and launch the new ministry shared in this magazine. We'll also pay off all our current debt and start setting money aside for our new worship center. We're going to save 1.5 million dollars or about 15% of the total budget, toward a new worship center in anticipation of the day that we can move forward in building it responsibly.

We can't predict the future. But I can tell you this, we should never be afraid of the future just because we can't predict it. What should we do? We should invest in it. We should buy the field and trust that one day, God will bring about a harvest on it.
