When you think about God, what questions come to mind?

There are two large buckets into which questions about God can get sorted. The first bucket holds our intellectual questions, and the other bucket is for our experiential questions.



Regardless of whether you consider yourself a Christian, just a person exploring spiritual things, or maybe you're brand new to thinking about God and faith: you've probably had experiences that brought up some questions about what you believe and what it looks like to have a spiritual life.

I want you to know that every one of your questions is normal. Even though I've been following Jesus for many years now, there are still moments that make me stop in my tracks and have to get clarity.

How do I connect with God and His ways experientially and meaningfully?

So, frankly, sometimes it seems like God is absent, and we wish to experience Him. Let's explore a few of those experience-based questions...

Where Is God In The Middle

of My Circumstances?



Let's get real - life hasn't quite turned out like any of us thought it would. I mean, the world as we understood it has been flipped upside down, turned inside out, and now looks a little backward to the one we grew up in! It's hard to see where God is present in your experience, especially in the unexpected circumstances that make themselves known to us.

Experiences like this can do one of two things; they can either push you away from God or draw you closer to Him. Hope is found as you lean into belief and faith and make an attempt to connect with God.

You, right now, have the power to make this moment, this season of circumstances in your life, something which moves you to discovering and experiencing God's ways.

How Can I Know Who God Is? And Can I Hear His Voice?

Psalm 23:4

To you, God might be as vague as a "higher power." God could also be an object of devotion, an unapproachable, divine being, or a best friend. There are so many opinions out there about God and His nature that it can feel overwhelming to think you could ever know and connect with God on a personal level.

Even so, the Bible (God's love letter to humanity) tells us that He desperately wants to communicate with you [Psalm 23:4]. Learning to recognize God's ways is an excellent way to start hearing His voice.
