

# Pastor's Paragraphs

"For everything there is a season..." Ecclesiastes 3:1

hanging seasons have been a part of my life for as long as I can remember. I have lived in three different states in my lifetime. As a child I attended four different elementary schools, three different middle schools, and three different high schools. We moved around quite a bit and, as such, I have called seventeen different towns/cities "home." Where some of you have been at Benson Baptist your whole lives, I have been a part of twelve different congregations — all in the last twenty years. I am no stranger to changing seasons!

Each of those shifts in my life were different. Some were great shifts and I celebrated the change. Others were extremely difficult and I entered them with great hesitation.

One thing that I have learned in all of that upheaval is that God has been with me every step of the way. When I was a kid, my understanding of God was very fractured. I didn't grow up in church, so much of my understandings of faith were pieced together from what I'd heard from my grandmother and what I saw on TV or read in books. I did not have a full view of who God was in the shifting seasons and, as such, in some of them I found myself angry at God. "Why did I have to move again? Why can't I keep the relationships I've built? Why must I keep starting over?"

Each time, the Spirit gently prodded

me along, reminding me that even the most difficult of changing seasons would eventually lead to good moments and great relationships. As an adult, I now look back on all of those shifts and see that God used them to get me where I am today.

The thing is, I didn't want them. I wanted things to stay the same, to stay comfortable and under my control. Sometimes we have a firm grip on the changes we face, but most of the time we don't get to choose.

The thing about it is, the seasons are going to come whether we have control of them or not. Change is going to show up even if we don't welcome it. That's just part of living our lives in this world.

The only thing that remains constant in the midst of all of that is the God who journeys with us. If all we do is focus on avoiding the change (or even sabotaging it), we miss the fullness of God's calling to the next season — whatever that may be for us or our community of faith.

As with so many others before, I have no idea what the next change in season will be for us. What I do know is that our constant God is with us. I wonder what beautiful seasons will come as we face the change we are being called to?

# Notes from Tool

Reflecting on my 30+ years in church music ministry makes me both sad and hopeful.

I am sad that most people no longer see church attendance as a high priority. Going to church is not just

part of my routine. It's where I get instruction, inspiration, and fellowship that are vital in my spiritual journey. I look around at all the empty spaces on Sundays and wonder where all the people are and how they are faring spiritually without regular undergirding of a church family and a live, in-person worship experience.

Maybe they are worshipping and studying somewhere else. But probably not. There was a time when church pews were full on Sunday mornings and not just when there was a wedding or funeral. As a music leader, there is nothing else like the sounds of voices lifted up in a full choir loft or a full sanctuary. I truly miss that.

I am hopeful, however, that some changes are taking place that one day will be seen as progress. Since the pandemic came in March 2020, we have added live-streaming and recorded services so that our homebound members and others can be part of the worship experience here when they are unable to attend in person. This has extended our reach to many more people, including a lot of non-members. To reach those who prefer small, informal gatherings over larger, formal worship services, we have begun looking at forming small groups who would meet either inside or outside our church walls.

We have also begun to have thoughtful discussions about topics that, while controversial, cry out for our attention. Topics such as racism, sexual orientation, and abortion have largely been ignored by churches in the past. We can't expect everyone to agree on these issues, but we as Christians should be able to engage in honest, informed, prayerful dialogue and try to deal with these issues as Jesus would.

On September 15 we had our first chancel choir rehearsal since the pandemic began. It was refreshing to see at least a few choristers return, to sit in beautiful, comfortable new chairs in the choir room, and to see newly painted walls. When I apologized for the new paint smell, William Massengill chimed in, "It's the smell of progress."

Change is inevitable. Let's follow William's example and celebrate change that is progress and avoid change for the sake of change.

Micha Boyett in Sarah Bessey's A "Rhythm of Prayer" writes a prayer called A Prayer Against Efficiency and in it she says this, "God, teach us to pause in this moment, to tuck ourselves into the curve of your slow arm, that we may know the miracle of now, the gift of this moment: you beside and beyond us, welcoming us outside of all we measure, and standing with us in it. May we see the goodness of our still hours and days, sunrises, sunsets, and the darkness where our rest is found. Order us, that we may stand within time holding your hand. That we may know we are enough, not because of what we make of these hours, but because within these hours - with you- we are being made."
