hroughout the Old Testament, we find moments where the people stop to mark places of significance related to God's work in their lives with stones. These markers, or cairns, were used to make sure the people, and all who passed by that place, would remember the journey they'd been on and how God was faithful.

As I've mentioned a few times on Sunday mornings, I did not grow up in a church setting. The closest I ever got to attending church regularly was a week of VBS every other summer. It was not until I was thirteen that I walked into a church youth group event and decided to become a disciple of Jesus.

Yet, there are many moments throughout my life to that point that marked the journey that had gotten me there. There were the VBS volunteers at churches whose names I'll never know. They showed me that church could be fun and that Jesus loved me. There were extended family members who told me about the Jesus they knew and tried to get me to follow him. There were times where my life was more like the valley of the shadow of death than any kid should endure where I felt a calming presence still guiding me.

Even though I was not a follower of Christ, there are still moments where I'd encountered God and God was faithful to me.

Today, whenever I go on a backpacking trip, long hike, or retreat, I find a stone to take with me to mark what I'd learned on that journey. In addition to the actual stones, my office is full of markers where my life and God's call intersected:

- Photos of the youth and college groups I'd served as minister in,
- Coffee mugs gifted to me by campus ministry students,
- Photos of friends and professors,
- Pottery gifted to me by previous supervisors,
- Four diplomas marking academic pursuits,
- Awards reminding me of communities that have helped me grow,
- My baptism certificate from 2002 reminding me of the beginnings of my faith journey and,
- My certificate of ordination reminding me of the congregation that recognized my calling to this work,
- Artwork made by my children at various stages of their growth,
- A mandala picked out for me from a friend at a marketplace in Nepal,
- A Mr. Potato Head that belonged to a late colleague to remind me of his creative spirit and love for art...

... the list goes on and on. Each of these things has meaning to me because they all are a part of the foundation of my faith journey to date.

Often we spend countless hours trying to find Christ's presence when, really, we've been encountering him all along.

I wonder what "cairns" mark your own journey with Christ. What makes up your foundation of faith?

Know that your journey is not over yet.

The best is yet to be and the foundations of your life are still being built.



Notes from Tool

here is an 18th century English hymn that we sing to an early American folk tune, and it tells of God's promises found in the Scriptures, more specifically in Isaiah 41:10, 43:2, Romans 8:3-39, Hebrews 13:5, and Deuteronomy 31:6:

How firm a foundation, ye saints of the Lord, Is laid for your faith in His excellent word! What more can He say than to you He hath said, To you who for refuge to Jesus have fled?

Fear not, I am with thee, O be not dismayed, For I am thy God, and will still give thee aid; I'll strengthen thee, help thee, and cause thee to stand, Upheld by My righteous, omnipotent hand.

When through the deep waters I call thee to go, The rivers of sorrow shall not overflow; For I will be with thee, thy troubles to bless, And sanctify to thee thy deepest distress.

When through fiery trials thy pathway shall lie, My grace, all sufficient, shall be thy supply; The flame shall not hurt thee; I only design Thy dross to consume, and thy gold to refine.

E'en down to old age all My people shall prove My sovereign, eternal, unchangeable love; And then, when grey hairs shall their temples adorn, Like lambs they shall still in My bosom be borne.

The soul that on Jesus hath leaned for repose, I will not, I will not desert to his foes; That soul, though all hell should endeavor to shake, I'll never, no, never, no, never forsake!

This hymn with an uncertain composer no doubt has been used in worship services at Benson Baptist Church since its inception. It still reminds us that our foundation is God's Word—not just the written version but also the Word made flesh in Jesus Christ. When we sing this great old hymn, we can lift our voices in confidence that our faith rests firmly on that sure foundation. Institutions, governments, and people in power rise and fall, but God's steadfastness and unfailing love endure.

WILL'S WHIMS

here are dozens of references to foundations scattered throughout scripture. These references generally relate to what we are expected to build our faith and lives upon, that is, Christ. How do we build that foundation?

At Benson Baptist, it begins with our children and youth ministries. A strong foundation doesn't begin with the Bible (what did he just say?!). A strong foundation begins with met needs. Are children and youth's basic needs being met? Are they safe? After these needs are fulfilled we ask ourselves: "Does this child feel like they belong?"

Creating intentional community is an absolute necessity in the local church. Without community, the church ceases to exist. Esteem is the next foundational block. For a youth or child to thrive, they must have self-worth.

This is especially true in the world of youth ministry. Our teenagers are slammed with a thousand different stimuli every single day. While social media plays an important role in our world, the negative self-image that can result from a variety of apps can leave our youth feeling "less than." Helping our youth

and children that they are a beloved child of God and that there's nothing that could separate them from the love of God becomes a paramount message. They are fearfully and wonderfully made and not only does God take great delight in them, their church family does too.

The last step is to ensure that they are prepared to leave the nest and strike out on their own. This might seem scary, and I would never trivialize the fear a parent might feel thinking about their child fending for themselves; however, they will be okay. That is part of the work of the church. Ensuring that when our children have grown into teenagers, and our teenagers have grown into adults, they have a strong enough foundation to accomplish anything.

This is where you come in. I love our children and youth and will always do everything I can to prepare them for life and especially a life guided by Christ — but I need your help! Ministry becomes more like extinguishing fires when there aren't others to help. Luckily, that's not the case at BBC. We have an awesome team of volunteers; however, there's always room for more. If you think your gifts might be best put to use working with our children or youth, reach out to me! Together we can continue the holy work of building a stronger foundation at BBC!

The View from Debbie's Desk

lived with my birth mother and siblings until I was 10. The only time that I remember going to church when I lived with her was when the local Salvation Army had an event where you could earn tickets for attending church and activities at the church. Then occasionally, you turned in the tickets for food. We had 6 kids so during those times we received a lot of food and didn't go hungry that's probably why I have good memories from going there. One of the children's activities was that we learned to play the tambourine. We would play them while the adults sang outside the Post Office to try and get donations from passerby's. The adults wore uniforms and I remember I wanted to wear one of those uniforms really bad but they didn't have my size.

When I was 15 or 16 after having already been adopted by my Aunt & Uncle a few of the local churches got together to show a Christian movie for FREE at the movie theater. My best friend and I went. I don't remember the name of the movie, but it impacted me like nothing ever had before. They had an altar call at the front of the theater at the end of the movie. Both of us went to the front crying and gave our hearts to the Lord. A couple of cute boys from our school came and talked to us afterwards. They gave us their numbers and I called them a few times asking questions about the bible. I called mostly because they were cute boys but even then, I knew that I had been led to Jesus. There wasn't a follow up from any of the churches and life and my teenage years took over and I put that at the back of my mind. But I never forgot.

My Aunt & Uncle (now Mom & Dad) were Catholic. We attended Mass every week and I found that I liked the tradition and the routine of a Catholic church. Mom and Dad did not make me go to school to learn catechism about Catholic history & traditions. They wanted me to make up my own mind. Which after about 7 years of living with them I decided that I did want to learn. They arranged for

me to have one on one lessons with one of the Priests. I went to three maybe four sessions, but I couldn't stay awake. I kept falling asleep while he was talking. It was very embarrassing. Here I was face to face with a priest, and I kept falling asleep. I decided that was God telling me I was not supposed to be Catholic. My parents were very upset, but I didn't go back.

When Don and I got married, we didn't go to church for years. But I was drawn to churches. When we were in Germany, sometimes I would see a church that I felt drawn to and I would stop and go in for a few minutes. (that was before they locked churches) The Lord was not giving up on me. He knew I was one of His even before I realized or truly understood it.

When we moved to Georgia, occasionally we would go to a church for a few weeks and then stop. We didn't feel like we belonged. We didn't feel accepted. But then when I was a cub scout leader one of my scouts was getting baptized (in a Baptist Church) and asked our family to come to the baptism. From the moment we first stepped into the building something was different. Miss Inez. She greeted us warmly and made us feel at home right away giving us big hugs to welcome us. We thoroughly enjoyed the service and afterwards, Don said "this is the church for us" I agreed. We went to Campbellton Baptist Church for years until Don got a job in a different state. Don, Josh and I were all baptized there. We were home.

Thank you, Lord, for guiding me on my journey to you. **Dehhie**





Benson Baptist... The Road to 135.

1886: Two young ministers, with the help of local resident Mrs. M.E. Hall, plant a new missionary Baptist church in the new community of Benson, NC.

January 24, 1887: Rev. J.L. Ennis and Elders J.M. Holleman, Allen Betts, J.L. Ennis and A.M. Campbell organize the first Baptist Church in Benson at the Rising Sun School House. They hold a worship service that day with five new members joining (including N.H. Gibbs, pictured right). The church was named 'Bethany Baptist' and Rev. J.L. Ennis was named its first pastor. The first business meeting of the church was held February 26, 1887.



1887-88: The first building is built on land located in the town of Benson, about 400 yards north of where our current campus now stands.

June 5, 1888: The first building is destroyed in a violent wind storm.

November 29, 1891: The second church building is built on land donated by the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad at the corner of West Church and Wall Streets (where the current campus now stands). It was a one-room frame building.



February 27, 1887: Julia F. Gibbs, Delia A. Gibbs, Mrs. M.E. Hall, and her daughters Sarah and Sarah were baptized in the first-ever baptism service held in a creek nearby where the church met.

September 10, 1887: The church gathered in conference and voted to change the name from 'Bethany Baptist' to 'Benson Baptist' to reflect the growing community around them. This was the first business meeting held after the church moved from the Rising Sun School to a location in the town limits of Benson.

July 1892: Revival is held in the second building and 19 new members are welcoming into the life of the church.

1903: Benson Baptist withdrew from the Little River Baptist Association of churches to help establish the a new local association of partner churches. During this time, the church only gathered for worship on one Sunday a month.

1906: The church moves to gathering twice a month on the second and fourth Sundays.

1913: The second church building is relocated about 200 yards north of our current site and was redesigned as a residence. It is still utilized as such to this day.





May 1951: The Parsonage is moved to N Wall Street and a new Parsonage is built on the existing lot. This is the Parsonage used today.

1943: The church returns to fulltime worship and activities following the Great Depression.

January 29, 1938: The stock market crashes and financial stability with it. The church votes to return to half time gatherings.

1920: The church moves to weekly worship and preaching every Sunday.

1918: The new sanctuary building's side Sunday school rooms are utilized as a temporary infirmary for men during the influenza epidemic. One man — Crosby Smith — died in the church's infirmary from the flu that year.

1916: The new sanctuary building, the one that is still utilized to this day, is dedicated.

November 1914: The first brick for a new sanctuary building is placed by Rev. J.M. Duncan with financing by Mr. Alonzo Parrish and

May 2, 1951: The church purchased the property immediately next to the Sanctuary owned Mrs. J.H. Rose and utilized it as 'The Annex.' The Annex housed Sunday school classes and

April 15, 1951: 48 people are baptized as part of a revival led by Rev. Thurman Stone.



1928: The church purchases a home and lot for

the Parsonage.

Parsonage is on this same lot.

The current

1956: The Sanctuary is renovated to including carpeting the floors, increasing the seating capacity to 150, and installing an air-conditioning system.

February 28, 1960: The new Education Wing is dedicated on the site of the former Annex building allowing for the expansion of Sunday School and other ministries. It also included a full kitchen and Fellowship Hall space.



1966: The basement of the Sanctuary building is renovated to include a new assembly room and smaller Sunday School classes.



1987: Both the town of Benson, and Benson Baptist Church celebrate their centennial. A special luncheon and service are held.

1967: A new
Kindergarten is started.
This would stay in place
until 1975 when the
Public School System
added Kindergarten.

December 31, 1980: The Parsonage is gutted by fire and renovations to its current state are completed.

1989: Narcotics Anonymous begins meeting in the building. They continue to meet twice a week at Benson Baptist to this day.

1975: At the stopping of the Kindergarten, the preschool program continues with spaces for three and four year old children to come three days a week.

1998: The property behind the Parsonage garage was purchased, as well as the property behind the Education Wing.

September 13, 2009: A new Contemporary service is added to the Sunday morning schedule with coffee and fellowship at 8:30 AM and worship in the Fellowship Hall at 9 AM every Sunday. The traditional service still met at 11 AM in the Sanctuary.



November 19, 2006: A dedication service is held for the new Fellowship Hall building, and to mark renovations completed in the current buildings including the addition of a conference room, parlor, staff offices, and elevator.

February 2020: The church begins virtually streaming our worship services for homebound members and others

March 15, 2020: The Diaconate votes to temporarily postpone worship services in light of the new COVID-19 virus. The church would gather virtually for one service for the next four months, with in-person and virtual options available in July 2020. The two services not returning until March 28, 2021.



January 24, 2022: Benson Baptist enters its 135th

year.

Even as we examine these deep roots, the question of "what's next?" should always be at the forefront of our hearts and minds. Our God is a God of "new wine in new wineskins" — a God who is making all things new. This newness includes the road ahead for Benson Baptist as a community of faith. What will our path look like moving forward? This question is only answered as we remember our deep roots, but always cast a forward vision — together.





From the BBC Archives:

Friday May 27, 1966

7:45 PM

Deacons present: Robert Warren, Edward Dixon, Otis Porter, Jesse T. Morgan, W.C. Adams, W.A. Barbour and Hiram Rose. Pulpit Committee members present: Dr. C.W. Sanders and Charles Turlington.

Opening prayer by W.A. Barbour .

Motion was made by W.A. Barbour and seconded by Otis Porter to install carpeting in the parsonage living and dinning rooms and the hall. Rose and Company submitted a price for this work, which was accepted by the Board.

preference to a trial sermon.

Motion was made by Hiram Rose and seconded by Charles Turlington to pay the moving expenses of the Layman family to Benson in the event he accepts our call to come as pastor.
