Call to Order - The meeting was called to order by Karen Gundelfinger at 7:10 PM.

**Roll Call** - Participants in the All-Church Conference were asked to notify the church via email and/or put their names into the ZOOM chat during the conference so that an accurate list of attendees could be compiled by office staff.

**Approval of 2020 Charge Conference Minutes** – Minutes were approved unanimously.

#### **Video Presentation of CUMC in 2020**

**SPRC Report -** Dante Honorico, SPRC Chairperson, presented the 2021 Clergy Salary & Benefits Package which was unanimously approved by the Conference. # Finance Report

It should come as no surprise that 2021 was a challenging year for the Finance Committee. After all, 2021 was a challenging year for all of us!

The committee's role as providing oversight for the annual budgets of the church and its ministries was complicated by the pandemic, of course. We established a budget in January 2021 not knowing when we could return to in-person services in the coming year, if at all. We set what we considered a conservative estimate of a return to in-person services in the third quarter of the year and were pleasantly surprised along with everyone else when we were able to open our doors earlier in the year.

The 2021 budget assumed \$407,550 in total income and \$415,151 in total expenses for an anticipated net loss of \$7,601. But thanks to a significant reduction in expenses and only a slight downturn in expected income, we ended up showing a small profit.

One benefit to opening the doors earlier than anticipated can be seen in the pledges received this year. We budgeted for pledges of \$270,500 for the year but our congregation was very generous and made \$304,219 in pledges. Yay CUMC!

Also, the Finance Committee recommended that the money needed to pay for an upgrade in our multimedia technologies should be tied to a specific fundraiser for the media team. We were very happy to see the church members donate considerably more than the \$30,000 the media team was seeking, which was especially helpful when the final costs for the new hardware came in higher than initially estimated. All in all, it was a hugely successful fundraiser for our church and has made our online and in-person services notably better.

So a challenging year ended up having several high notes. We start 2022 with more challenges ahead, but we are optimistic thanks to the generous spirit of this congregation.

# All-Church Conference Worship Ministries

#### **Continued Livestream On-line and Drive-In Services**

Worship Ministries began the New Year by maintaining worship services through the very successful **Livestreaming weekly services** on Youtube and Facebook, reaching about 180 participants each week. **Drive-In Services** recurred as parishioners gathered for monthly services. Participants remained in their cars as greeters recorded attendance for contact tracing and ushers guided parking following COVID procedures.

<u>Epiphany</u> was commemorated by Pastor Elbert Kim as he conducted a "Call to Jesus" worship series the weeks after Advent. The altar area showed progressing steps and a pathway to become closer to God through Epiphany. <u>Mardi Gras</u> was celebrated on the church patio as a gala Drive-In Service, complete with musical instruments and Mardi Gras banners and decorations. Progressing through <u>Lent</u> with a worship series "The Five Commitments", Ash Wednesday was remembered by placing prayers of repentance in a fire pit on the parking lot at sunset.

#### **Hybrid Services**

Plans for **Hybrid Services** continued with on-line presentation and minimum worship in-person participation by staff and leadership personnel and the media team. COVID guidelines and mask wearing continues to be enforced while on CUMC campus. <u>Palm Sunday</u> was re-enacted with children carrying palms, and prerecorded Bells participation. <u>Easter</u> was celebrated as people were invited to church for an outdoor service. Canopies were set up, Easter lilies lined the patio and a full band with trumpets and singers shared in the glory of Easter. Participants joined the service in chairs in the parking lot in front of the church stairway.

#### **Sanctuary Lighting and Media Remodel**

Following Easter, the Sanctuary was closed for nearly two months due to lighting and media remodeling. Weekly worship services continued to be held outdoors through *Eastertide* with a sermon series of "Living the Resurrection" with a focus on the senses. During May, the relaunch team carefully restructured best practices to re-enter the sanctuary in person following COVID rules. Photos and directions for social distancing were reviewed and publicized for returning in person for worship.

# **In-Person Worship Resumes**

<u>Pentecost</u> brought the completion of the sanctuary media and lighting remodel and **in-person worship** recommenced. The congregation was "back again" and the sermon series focused on "What gives us hope and joy". The worship production teams including ushers, greeters, media, communion, memorial and wedding, gathered old and new members and continue to reach out to community members. Celebrations of *Graduation* and *Confirmation* were held and topped off in June with a Father's Day Pops concert and barbecue following the worship service held in Friendship Garden. The Mr Softee truck

culminated the day. The new Crescendo program was successfully launched and celebrated with 150 participants for a week in August.

<u>Rally Sunday</u> and the sermon series "Mission Possible" set off a whirlwind of activities as 25+ groups were represented in a "Ministry Fair" theme in Brooks Hall. Enthusiasm and excitement continued to rebuild as new and old relationships formed in small group connections and welcoming ministries. Several new Adult Ministries groups formed that provide opportunities for learning and growing. The sermon series of "The Great Commandment" included New Member Welcome and Baptism leading to <u>World Communion Sunday</u> and a final Retirement Celebration for Rev. Gary Keene.

Music ministries have scheduled regular in-person weekly Choir practices and Bells practices with the choir singing during church three times per month and Bells performing one time per month. Following <u>All Saints Sunday</u> in October, the stewardship sermon series of "Bee the Church" led us into being thankful, grateful and intentional in all circumstances.

<u>Advent</u> welcomed the "Light of Christmas" with the sermon series "Be Hope, Peace, Joy and Love" with an event-filled season. Many Christmas events took place in the holiday-decorated sanctuary and included the Family Christmas Celebration followed by activities in Brooks Hall. The Choir and Bell Concert weekend celebrated the Christmas story through its traditional concert in word, music and song on Friday and Saturday. Christmas Eve Services were shared with a Family Service led by the youth through music and drama as well as a traditional Candlelight Service. CUMC also participated with a float in the Camarillo Christmas Parade.

The weekly business of worship continues with a lot of work behind the scenes to create memorable worshipful experiences. Much gratitude and thankfulness goes to the selfless gifts of time, energy and commitment of the many hands and hearts of the members of Camarillo United Methodist Church. Sincere acknowledgement and appreciation goes to the Staff, Lay leaders and Musicians for their commitment, leadership and sense of appropriateness and perfection each and every day.

<u>Weekly Worship</u>: 2021 was a year of possibility and promise with everyone awaiting the reduction in covid restrictions, a vaccine and ultimately the lifting of worries from the pandemic. The first half of the year was spent holding steady with online worship, socially distant small groups and various outdoor gatherings. At the end of spring we transitioned to limited in-person worship, while maintaining our online worship services ensuring everyone could be reached. We opened the doors to in-person Sunday school, the nursery, fellowship time, youth group, small study groups, bell choirs, and many other less restricted ministry programs.

<u>Children's and Youth Ministry:</u> In June, the first big festivity of summer could not have been more fitting, than a celebration of our confirmands and graduates. After several years of not hosting a confirmation class, Pastor Elbert led students through 10 weeks of study and spiritual growth classes. The celebration of students was the perfect way to observe the many ways God was present in the life of our church families.

Mid summer the campus was home to a second year of CSP, a.k.a. Camarillo Service Project. CUMC youth teams spent the week clearing weeds from our gardens, restoring paint in the parking lot, and building two new lending libraries at the request of our med-supply team. In the community, the youth teams partnered with Food Share to learn about the importance of gleaning while successfully picking 4000lbs+ of oranges. Their final day was spent cleaning, painting and repairing the learning space of a neighborhood preschool. Leaving our campus to help our neighbors is just one example of the many ways our youth group spread hope in a challenging time.

Trunk or treat was back, this time led by our youth and children's ministry directors, with festive trunks decorated by 30+ members. The event featured games, trunks and a costume parade. Children and adults from the community were thrilled to participate in this much loved annual celebration of treats.

<u>Community Outreach</u>: The ability to offer more programs, also meant the opening of doors to our community partners as well. Much needed blood drives were hosted by CUMC under the direction of a community partner, The American Red Cross in June and December.

To round out the month of June, CUCM hosted a classic summer picnic & concert in Friendship Garden. The afternoon event was just the fellowship everyone was seeking sun, summer, music, BBQ and of course ice cream. The concert/picnic was well attended by members and friends.

<u>Music Ministry</u>: Fusing outreach and music ministry was Crescendo Music Camp. This first year summer music camp was a sold out event. Children from grades K-8 were building music knowledge & skills, developing performance confidence, learning from experts in the field and connecting with many new friends. The week closed with an impressive musical performance featuring the talented students of Crescendo Music Camp. The entire sanctuary was filled with guests, music, excitement, leaving all those in attendance with an overwhelming glow of hope.

For the season of Advent, every weekend in December offered a way to worship and get in the spirit of the season. Opening with the ever popular Family Christmas Celebration with our youth sharing their version of the "Real Story of Christmas. The return of the much loved Annual Christmas Choir Concert Series featuring the CUMC Chancel Choir, Adult Bell Choir and guest soloists. Guests were able to enjoy two full evenings of music celebrating The Light of Christmas.

<u>Other Ministry</u>: In-person Rally Sunday, members had a chance to travel around (passports included) to hear first hand about the up-coming fall ministry programs. The rally featured a variety of offerings such as Adult Ministries, Caring Ministries, Children's Ministries, Disaster Preparedness, Dolphin Pantry, Family Ministries, Fellowship, Maker Ministry, Media Team, Medical Supply, Men's Ministry, Mission, Music, Weeding Team and Women's Ministry.

In October we were able to host a few long awaited celebrations. A momentous retirement celebration for Rev. Gary Keene on World Communion Sunday and an official welcoming of Rev. Elbert Kim and his family. The two celebrations were great reminders of all the good these two leaders and their families have blessed our community and congregation with.

Children's, Family, and Maker Ministry teams organized and hosted an Advent Calendar Maker Workshop where guests had the chance to make their own custom-built Advent Calendar, or make one as a gift for someone in need of a smile.

The same team also partnered on the creation and implementation of our parade float decorations for the Camarillo Christmas Parade. The parade float was filled with families of all ages, music and lots of Christmas cheer. This was a fun old tradition restored and a great way for CUMC to be a source of light in our community.

Reflecting on 2021, CUMC continued to find creative ways to worship, and bring people together under uncertain conditions. We found a way to offer meaningful connections online, and in-person. The resilient and perseverant nature of our members are just a few qualities that make us United Methodists.

# **CUMC Youth & Family Ministries**

As you all know, 2021 has been a year of ups and downs, stops and starts, forging ahead and regrouping. In December of last year, our county was once again put on lockdown due to COVID-19 and our annual Christmas traditions put on hold. Many events were canceled, but our CUMC Youth planned and implemented a Drive-Family Christmas Eve service, designed especially for these times of social distancing. While wearing masks and standing 6 feet apart, the youth presented the Christmas story and message through scripture, drama, and music. They reenacted the Christmas story, with different church families taking the roles of Mary and Joseph, the angels, the shepherds, and the Wise People. It was a very moving and uplifting service to end 2020, complete with a glorious sunset to close.

In January, Ventura County was still on lockdown, so the new year was kicked off via Zoom! CUMC Youth had a Zoom New Year's party, Zoom games, and even a Super Bowl party on Zoom! In late February, we were approved to start meeting in person, but outdoors and masked. We played a lot of very active games, went for a bike ride, and had an outdoor movie night, all which met social distancing guidelines. We didn't care, we were just happy to be TOGETHER!

In March, we had a wonderful Glow in the Dark Easter egg hunt with our youth, children, and preschoolers from our Child Development Center. We did crafts, had stories, and hunted for glowing eggs in our Friendship Garden. It was a really fun event - and was attended by approximately 150 people! (All outdoors and masked, of course)

In April we started Confirmation classes with Pastor Elbert, and in June we had 6 youth join our church. On the same day, we recognized our graduates. Thankfully by that time we were back to doing in-person worship in our sanctuary and could honor these youth in person!

CUMC Youth have been attending Sierra Service Project for more than 25 years, but for the second year in a row, SSP was unable to provide in-person service projects. We were disappointed to miss SSP, but quickly regrouped and planned our second year of Camarillo Service Project. This year, we met for 5 days in June, doing work both at our church and in our community. We helped spruce up the Pleasant Valley Co-op Preschool by painting, weeding, and cleaning for 2 days. We also spent a day "gleaning" oranges at a local ranch to donate to Food Share. We had 22 youth participating and it was a wonderful week of service, music, fellowship, and fun!

Over the summer, our youth learned about Creation Care, a topic that is very near and dear to their hearts. We talked about our covenant with God to care for the earth and how to best do that. The youth learned about recycling, climate change and even built their own composting bins! They were so passionate about this topic, that we chose it as the theme of our annual youth-led worship service. The youth shared their message through prayer, song, "Tips from Teens", and a theatrical productions entitled "Can o' Blame". After the service, they handed out information about recycling and composting. Our youth are truly leaning in and getting ready to be the leaders of tomorrow!

Our children and families have also been very busy this year! In order to stay connected during the times that we were most isolated, our Sunday school director did bi-monthly park days, which evolved into Wacky Wednesdays, when the kids get together for games, crafts, and a fun science experiment. During the pandemic, the children had Sunday school outside on the patio to allow for fresh air and social distancing. With winter and cold weather coming, however, they are looking forward to moving into their new Kids' Club. An unused classroom in the education wing is being renovated for their use, and they are looking forward to having their own space!

CUMC Family Ministries kept our congregation active and involved this past year by scheduling safe yet fun activities for all. We started the year with a Car scavenger hunt, where families drove all over town to collect or take pictures of things on their list. It was a heated competition and very fun. In February, we did a Zoom baking class with our expert youth baker, Sarah Kistler. We baked some delicious cookies and learned a lot about baking. In March, families participated in the Glow in the Dark Easter egg hunt, which was a blast. Over 150 people came and enjoyed crafts and games outside while waiting for it to get dark. April we sponsored a Native American Ministries night where we learned about caring for the earth, made our own rainsticks and learned a song to play along with, and had Three Sisters Stew. May and June were musical months: May was our annual bell choir concert (which was pre-recorded for the first time) and In June, when restrictions had eased, we presented CUMC Pops, at outdoor concert and picnic In our Friendship Garden.

In August, we had our first ever Crescendo Summer Music Camp. 48 children signed up and attended 4 classes daily: Bells or chimes, Singing, Dance and Movement, and Music Enrichment. We ended each day with a performance by a local musician. At the end of the week, we presented our concert to the congregation, families, and the community. It was a fabulous week of learning, fun, and friendship. We can't wait to do it again next year!

This fall, we had a family movie night in Friendship Garden and were delighted to be able to do Trunk or Treat this year. Over 70 children and youth came and played games, heard stories, and, of course, got lots of candy during trunk or treat! Next up- we will be making Advent calendars to take home and share with others.

With November here, we are looking forward to the holidays and being able to celebrate Thanksgiving and Christmas, together and indoors. We are busily planning our Advent Event ,annual Christmas concerts, Family Christmas Celebration, and Family Christmas Eve service. We plan to be masked, but are thankful to be together once again. We look ahead to 2022 with hope and comforted with the knowledge that with God, all things are possible, even during uncertain times.

# Pastor's Report

The year 2021 began at the height of the coronavirus pandemic. CUMC continued to monitor the guidelines set by the state and county health services. Worship was primarily online with occasional monthly drive-in worship services to provide some sense of gathering as a community. All other programs were held online, including zoom classes for adult education and youth gatherings. Sunday school packets were sent home for our children's ministry.

With the approval of the COVID vaccines, CUMC ran a campaign to vaccinate much of our senior population. Our youth called every member on our senior population and arranged to have their vaccination appointments. By Spring, we were eager to begin preparations to offer in-person worship services. With our Sanctuary still unoccupied, it was the perfect opportunity to update the 40 year old electrical and lighting system. CUMC ran a successful Lighting Project Capital Campaign, spearheaded by Marian Brock and the Media Team. Within three weeks, we had raised \$35K to upgrade new lights and cameras for ongoing online worship.

Starting from Easter, outdoor worship was introduced along with drive-in and online access. For seven weeks, our worship team and media teams worked hard to make every opportunity available for people to engage in Sunday services. With the new lights installed before Pentecost and with the approval from the Conference to go ahead with in-person worship, a team of volunteers gathered on Saturday before Pentecost to wipe down and thoroughly clean the Sanctuary that had been unoccupied for 14 months.

On Pentecost Sunday, we began in-person worship services with 119 in attendance. It was a glorious celebration with our bell choir providing special music and everyone abiding by the safety protocols. Health screening were done before each event and fellowship hour was extremely limited. But since then, our gatherings has continued to grow and the congregation becoming more aware of how to navigate the safety protocols. In June, we celebrated the confirmation with seven of our youth, including a baptism. On July 4th, Rev. Sandy Liddell came to guest preach for us. Through the Summer, we set our sights on relaunching all of our full programming on Rally Sunday, including our vocal choir, coffee fellowship, adult education classes, and many other inperson activities. A ministry fair highlighted all the ministries that this church offered.

On World Communion Sunday, we welcomed Rev. Gary Keene for a recognition of his retirement that was long overdue. Presiding over the common table, Pastor Gary and I served the congregation as a symbol of passing the baton. In November, we ran a successful stewardship campaign that exceeded the pledge goal for 2022. We are beginning the new year with great hopes of what we can accomplish as a church in building the ministry. During the Christmas season, we excitedly returned to in-person concerts and worship services celebrating Advent and Christmas. Our Sunday worship attendance averages about 154 with about 99 viewers online.

As we continue to navigate through this pandemic, CUMC will continue to serve the community and congregation while still being cautious and mindful of proper health protocols. From baptisms to fellowship luncheons, Camarillo United Methodist Church is alive and well looking forward to even more ways to serve the community.
