JANUARY 13, 2020

MEMBERS PRESENT: Crissy Carter, Mayor John Choat, Judge Larry Curling, Mayor Arthur Green, Judge Garrett Gruber, Lori Harper, Mayor Carter Hendricks, Mayor Bill Hesser, JoAnn Holder, Gary Jones, Adam Ledford, Judge Todd Mansfield, Curtis McGehee, Judge Perry Newcom, Roger Simpson, Bernard Standard, Terry Stringer, Judge Steve Tribble, Judge Wade White, Judge Jack Whitfield, Mayor Jan Yonts, and Mayor Kota Young.

I. CALL TO ORDER: Perry Newcom, Board Vice Chair called the meeting to order at 12:06 p.m. with a quorum present.

II. PLEDGE/INVOCATION: Mr. Gary Jones led the pledge and Judge Wade White led the invocation.

III. MINUTES: Minutes of the December 9, 2019 Board Meeting were presented for review and approval. A copy is attached to and made a part of these minutes. There were no questions or concerns.

Motion was made by Mayor Jan Yonts to approve the December 9, 2019 minutes as presented. Mayor Bill Hesser seconded the motion and the motion carried.

IV. APPROVAL OF FINANCIAL REPORT: Ms. Alisha Sutton, PADD Chief Administrative Officer, presented the December 31, 2019 Monthly Expenditure Report for review and approval. A copy is attached to and made a part of these minutes. Total personnel expenses are at 43.93% and total travel expenses are at 40.19%. Total operating expenses are at 71.57% of budget. Total expenditures are 48.02% of the budget. Total Budget YTD is \$1,834,091.24. There were no questions or concerns.

Motion was made by Judge Steve Tribble to approve the financial report as presented. Mayor Arthur Green seconded the motion and the motion carried.

V. MEETINGS: A list of upcoming meetings was provided; informational.

VI. FEDERAL AND STATE REPORTS:

1. U.S. Senator Mitch McConnell/Morgan Alvey – Ms. Morgan Alvey, Field Representative, stated impeachment proceedings have kept the headlines busy and articles will be transitioning over from the House to the Senate this week. The Senator's appropriation bill last month secured designation of a portion of the Western Kentucky Parkway as a spur to I69 in Muhlenberg and Ohio counties which will benefit economic development in those areas; \$25M for the War on Asian Carp in West KY; \$61M in new construction projects for Fort Campbell; and \$19.5B increase in defense spending, which included a 1.3% pay raise for our service members. Please contact Senator McConnell's office if we can be of assistance.
2. U.S. Senator Rand Paul/Jason Hasert – Mr. Jason Hasert, Field Representative, stated recent storms caused a lot of damage and their office has as full-time staffer who handles FEMA issues should you need assistance. In 2020, Senator Paul's focus is on cost cutting and reducing national debt spending; infrastructure such as building roads, I69 spur; the Cost

Cutters ACT passed through Homeland Security is an incentive to find ways to reduce spending and identify wasteful spending or corruption by agencies who push their budgets to the limit. The incentive would provide a “reward” or “bonus” to agency employees who can reduce spending or identify ways to aid in this process. If their office can be of assistance, please let him know.

3. U.S. Congressman James Comer/Corey Elder – Mr. Corey Elder, Field Representative, stated Congressman Comer is focusing in 2020 on foreign policy events such as Iran, and Congressman Comer was a “no” vote on the resolution to scale back the President’s foreign aggression; supporting the 2nd Amendment of which he confirmed his commitment last week on the House floor; and the importance of the Census count of all citizens for grant funding going forward. If you have any concerns or need assistance, please contact our office.
4. Kentucky Transportation Cabinet/Mark Welch – Mr. Mark Welch, Field Representative, reported Governor Beshear appointed Greg Thomas as Secretary for the KY Transportation Cabinet, replacing Mike Hancock. A Commissioner for Rural and Municipal Aid has not yet been named. Mr. Welch will notify us of any changes in field representatives. Projects are still in the pipeline.

Mayor Carter Hendrick, City of Hopkinsville gave a brief report on storm damage in the city to include the Senior Citizens Center, CCHS, UHA, Ruff Park and several residences. Electric companies were quick to respond and KACo has done a great job responding for insurance purposes. We are fortunate there were no injuries sustained.

VII. REPORTS:

1. Area Agency on Aging & Independent Living – Ms. Jill Collins, Director, Pennyriple AAAIL, reported the procurement process has started for Home Care and Title III Services; a timeline is provided in the board packets and a copy is attached to and made a part of these minutes. The process should be completed and contracts awarded by April 2020. The Veteran’s program continues to grow with 80 active clients receiving services. The program includes four ADDs in KY and five ADDs in TN and a solid partnership with medical centers in Marion, IL and Nashville, TN. On Wednesday, January 15, 2020, annual training will be conducted at the PADD office. At the end of December, Pennyriple AAAIL received two grant awards from Humana: \$10,000 to implement a food waste program and \$3,800 to provide additional emergency meals that are shelf stable. The food waste program will utilize over produced food not served on steam tables in hospitals that can be packaged and delivered to clients; more information will be forthcoming. Ms. Collins recognized Cindy Tabor, LTC Ombudsman, for her work coordinating this year’s Forgotten Angel Tree program. 400 residents in personal care homes received Christmas gifts through the program. The Christian County Senior Citizens Center received extensive damage from recent storms and no food services are being provided today. Residents have emergency meals in their homes for instances such as this. We are working to coordinate meal production at other sites and implementing a contingency plan with PACs for congregate meals. Delivery status and schedules will be released via social media and through ADRC. A copy of the Aging Waiting List is provided in the board packets. There were no questions or concerns.
2. Community & Economic Development – Ms. Angie Crawford, CED Projects Coordinator, gave a slide presentation overview of grant opportunities for the Recreational Trails Program, Land and Water Conservation Fund, and Recycling and Household Hazardous Waste Collection; information is also included in the January issue of the PADD Press. A copy of the slide presentation is attached to and made a part of these minutes. The COPs Hiring Program hires entry-level career law enforcement officers and provides 75% for the approved entry-level salaries and fringe benefits up to \$125,000 per officer over a three-year grant

period. The officer must be retained 1 year thereafter. Application deadline is March 11, 2020. Ms. Crawford also announced the Kentucky Department for Public Health will be funding grants to develop new Walk/Bike Master Plans for the cities in eight of the Pennyriple ADD counties this year. The local county health departments and County Judge Executives will be involved in helping to guild these master plans. In addition, there will be a guest speaker at the next PADD Transportation Committee meeting on January 23, 2020 that will provide an overview on how these grants will work. We anticipate starting the first county's master plan in the next few weeks. For questions contact Craig Morris, Angie Crawford or Jared Nelson at the PADD Office. There were no questions or concerns.

3. West Kentucky Workforce – Ms. Sheila Clark, WKWB Director, reported copies of the Labor Market Snapshot for November 2018-2019 is included in the board packets. The West Kentucky Workforce Board meeting is scheduled for tomorrow, January 14, 2020 at 10:00 a.m. at the HHC Emerging Technologies Building in Hopkinsville with guest speaker Deputy Secretary Josh Benton of the KY Education and Workforce Development Cabinet. Secretary Benton will share changes at the cabinet and their focus for the future. West KY Workforce board meetings in the future will be held at the community colleges. Ms. Clark provided an update on recent activity surrounding assistance to dislocated workers:
 - Briggs & Stratton/Murray – a career center has been established in Murray to assist dislocated workers with resumes, interview skills, applications and unemployment. A second job fair will be held on January 17.
 - Ebonite/Hopkinsville – a job fair was held for dislocated workers and in addition to employers, resource agencies associated with the United Way were also on site. A second job fair to assist dislocated workers will be held in the near future.

Ms. Julie Allen, Workforce Programs Coordinator, provided a Rapid Response update. September 2019 began a season of layoffs and we have been very busy providing services to over 2,100 dislocated workers. Once notified of a layoff, Rapid Response meetings are coordinated to provide helpful information and the opportunity to get one-on-one assistance from our staff in order to help them find their next job. This week, Rapid Response meetings are being coordinated for Brazeway (Christian County), and Pride Coal Mine (Hopkins/Muhlenberg Counties). Rapid Response meetings are being coordinated on January 21 & 23 for dislocated workers of Genesis Coal Mine (Ohio). Job Fairs will also be coordinated to assist these dislocated workers in the near future. There were no questions or concerns.

4. Census Update – Ms. Kische Jeffrey-Mische, U.S. Census Bureau Field Representative, provided an update on census activities. In February, group quarters counting will begin (i.e. college dorms, military installations, jails, etc.). Recruitment is ongoing and Christian County has reached 100%. Many other counties such as Todd, Trigg and Logan are close to reaching recruitment goals, but still need help filling roles. KY Youth Advocates are participating in all KY schools on March 2-6, 2019 and will be eligible for the sweepstakes; last year South Christian Elementary School was the sweepstakes winner of \$500 for their school. A Census Epic Hour is scheduled to be held on January 14, 2020 at the Christian County Public Library at 5:00 p.m. The census is April 1, 2020; please keep it in the forefront of your mind and advocate for participation. The census determines distribution of \$675B in federal funding and ensures we have adequate representation in the House and Senate. There were no questions or concerns.

VIII. NEW BUSINESS:

1. FY'19 Audit Report – Ms. Jaime Peterson, Calhoun & Company, PLLC, provided draft copies of the FY'19 Audit Report, an Executive Summary, and Letter of Communication. Copies are attached to and made a part of these minutes. Ms. Peterson stated the audit report is in draft as they are waiting for the release letter from APA; however, they do not anticipate any changes. Ms. Peterson provided an overview of the financial statements ending June 30, 2019, stating information presented fairly in all material respects in relation to the financial statements as a whole. Two new accounting standards were adopted as described in Note 9 to the financial statements: GASB Statement No. 83, “Certain Asset Retirement Obligations” and GASB Statement No. 88 “Certain Disclosures Related to Debt, including Direct Borrowings and direct Placements” and there have been no changes in application of existing policies during 2019. A summary of Audit Results is located on page 70 of the report. There were no disagreements with Management and information requested was provided in a timely manner, Testing was performed on the WIOA Cluster of funds to include adult, youth and dislocated worker funds. No findings, deficiencies, weaknesses or compliance issues were noted.

Ms. Peterson reviewed the Executive Summary depicting revenue generated including a breakdown by statutory basis and by program. She also reviewed expenses incurred including a breakdown by statutory basis, change in net position, and change in net liabilities associated with retirement. There were no observations, questions, or concerns by the committee.

Motion was made by Mayor Bill Hesser to accept the FY '19 Audit Report as presented. Mayor Jan Yonts seconded the motion and the motion carried.

2. Monthly Code of Ethics Report – Judge Perry Newcom, Board Vice Chair, stated no violations have been reported during the month. A few PADD employees have submitted disclosure statements due to relatives who are dislocated workers and are utilizing services/benefits provided through the West KY Workforce. Informational; no action required.
3. Director's Report – Mr. Vincent, PADD Executive Director, expressed appreciation to Jaime Peterson of Calhoun & Company, PLLC and PADD financial staff for their hard work on the FY'19 Audit. Mr. Vincent gave the following report:
 - PADD Executive Committee – members of the Executive Committee met earlier today and reviewed:
 - i. Expiring terms of two PD&GC Board members. Board members reappointed for a three-year term were Mr. Eddie DeArmond (Muhlenberg Co.) and Mr. Sherman Chaudoin (Caldwell Co.).
 - ii. Declaration of surplus equipment, which includes computer equipment and two Ford Taurus vehicles. Information will be provided in the near future to units of local Government.
 - FY'20 Budget Amendments – Mr. Vincent stated each member of the management team reviewed budget amendments per their respective area with the Executive Committee. Copies are included in the board packets; a copy is attached to and made a part of these minutes.

Ms. Alisha Sutton, Administrative Officer, reviewed amendments to the FY'20 budget, which were adjustments to actual allocations. Overall, Total Budget is \$15,750,490 reflecting an increase of \$2,698,444; Total Service Budget is \$11,477,546 reflecting an increase of \$2,327,622; for a Total Operating Budget of \$4,272,944 reflecting an increase of 370,822.

Ms. Sutton reviewed the Revised FY'20 Expenses. Copies were provided and a copy is

attached to and made a part of these minutes. Full-time salaries decreased (\$6,441) and benefits decreased (\$36,302) as two full-time positions have not been filled for an accounting clerk and Ft. Campbell policy position. Part-time salary & benefits increased \$23,766 due to a new IT position for Briggs & Stratton and administrative positions to assist with data entry and fill in when the receptionist is absent. Total Personnel is \$2,975,566 reflecting an overall decrease of (\$18,977). There were no changes in Travel. Under Operating Expenses, WKWB Direct Program Expenses increased \$125,000 due to receiving a grant from the Department of Labor for Briggs & Stratton to fund items needed such as additional staffing and establishing a new career center. Total Revised Operating Expenses are at \$3,925,844, reflecting an overall increase of \$106,023. There were no questions or concerns.

Motion was made by Mr. Gary Jones to accept the FY'20 Budget Amendments as presented. Judge Jack Whitfield seconded the motion and the motion carried.

- LTCO Conflict of Interest – Mr. Vincent stated every other year all Board members are required to complete a Conflict of Interest form for our Long Term Care Ombudsman program. A copy is included in the board packets; please complete, sign and give it to Cheri Farmer before January 31.
- KCADD Legislative Breakfast – is scheduled for February 13 from 7:00 to 8:30 a.m.; an informational flyer is included in the board packets. The KCADD Board meeting will follow at 8:45 a.m. If you wish to attend and need hotel accommodations, please let Cheri Farmer know.
- KLC City Day/City Night – is scheduled for February 12; an informational flyer is included in the board packets.
- West KY Thank You Night – is scheduled for February 13; an informational flyer is included in the board packets.
- KACo Legislative Reception – is scheduled for February 20; an informational flyer is included in the board packets.
- 2020 NADO Washington Conference – is scheduled for March 15-18, 2020 in Washington, DC; an informational flyer is included in the board packets. Unfortunately, Congress will be in recess, but we plan to schedule meetings with Legislative Office Staff. If you wish to attend, please let Cheri Farmer know by January 15.

- PADD Board of Directors – a list of members of the PADD Board of Directors is provided in the board packets; informational.

SUBJECT TO AUDIT

2020 Delta Regional Authority (DRA) States' Economic Development Assistance Program (SEDAP)

The DRA federal funding program is only available to participating member states, local governments (city and county), public bodies, and non-profit entities. Private/For-Profit entities are NOT eligible for DRA funding.

Applicants must clearly demonstrate how a project meets at least one Federal Priority Eligibility Criteria and one DRA Regional Development Plan Goal and must assure sustainability of the project after DRA funding.

Federal Priority Eligibility Criteria

1. Innovation & Small Business – Projects that include business and industry prospects committed to job creation and/or retention, through the execution of a DRA Participation Agreement.
2. Regional Impact – Projects that provide benefit to constituents in multiple counties or multiple municipalities within a single county.
3. Multiple Funding Partners – Projects which include multiple funding sources and significantly leverage DRA dollars to other federal or non-federal dollars
4. Emergency Funding Need – Projects that can clearly demonstrate, but for DRA funding, the negative implications of inaction would result in immediate and detrimental health and/or safety issues for the constituents served.
5. Registered Apprenticeship – Projects supporting registered apprenticeship programs and sustainable career pathways with partners at the local, regional and statewide levels
6. Infrastructure – DRA is congressionally mandated to expend 50% of its appropriated SEDAP dollars on Basic Public and Transportation Infrastructure projects
7. Merging and Consolidating Public Utilities – connecting or merging systems, sharing resources, and eliminating unmanageable utility services
8. Broadband Infrastructure – sustainable, public projects which serve to increase local access to high speed wired or wireless internet
9. Water or Wastewater Rate Study – additional consideration will be given to project which include evidence of an accredited rate study having been completed within the past three years and showing progress toward implementation

DRA Regional Development Plan Goals

1. Workforce Competitiveness – advance the productivity and economic competitiveness of the Delta workforce
2. Infrastructure – strengthen the Delta's physical, digital, and capital connections to the global economy
3. Community Competitiveness – facilitate local capacity building within Delta communities, organizations, businesses, and individuals

Eligible Activities

1. Basic Public Infrastructure – water and wastewater facilities, electric and gas utilities, broadband delivery and solid waste landfills, all of which are fundamental services necessary to sustain and promote growth and/or attract business.
2. Transportation Infrastructure – roadways, bridges, rail, port facilities, and airports and other structures deemed central to an overall transportation system

3. Business Development – emphasis on entrepreneurship, business creation, business retention, and business expansion
4. Workforce Development – job training or employment related education with an emphasis on the use of existing public institutions located in the region; registered apprenticeship

2020 Allocation and Application Requirements

Kentucky SEDAP Allocation - \$1,316,270.21

Community Infrastructure Fund - \$15,000,000 (allocation for eight state DRA region)

Applications must be submitted electronically through the Local Development District (Pennyrile Area Development District) for review between March 2 and May 31, 2020. Projects that rank as a Tier 1 (has Participation Agreement for jobs, regional impact, and leverages other funds) will be considered as they are submitted. Although Senators were not able to approve the measure before breaking for the Presidents Day recess, we are hopeful that lawmakers will pass it shortly after they return to DC next week.

Senate Unanimously Approves Older Americans Act Reauthorization!

March 3, 2020

Senators today capped off a year-long advocacy effort to reauthorize the federal Older Americans Act (OAA) by unanimously approving the bipartisan, bicameral bill, the Supporting Older Americans Act of 2020, H.R. 4334, to authorize funding for and operation of vital OAA programs through 2024!

"n4a is thrilled that the Senate has passed the Supporting Older Americans Act of 2020," said n4a CEO Sandy Markwood in a [statement](#). "This bill is the result of months of negotiations among Senate and House leadership, as well as aging policy advocates and n4a members here in Washington and around the country."

Because the House and Senate must pass identical pieces of legislation, H.R. 4334 now heads back across Capitol Hill where we are hopeful that Representatives will take up the measure swiftly.

While a modest piece of legislation—as most bipartisan bills are—the Supporting Older Americans Act of 2020 contains many of n4a's OAA [reauthorization priorities](#). n4a also [endorsed](#) the measure last month and led an effort securing support for the bill from [120 other national organizations](#)!



LWA Unemployment Rates (January 2019 – December 2020)





KRS 147A – ADD Enabling Legislation/Regulations

147A.050 Area development districts created.

There is hereby created and established in the Commonwealth fifteen (15) area development districts consisting of the following counties:

- (1) Purchase Area Development District which shall include the counties of Ballard, Carlisle, Hickman, Fulton, McCracken, Graves, Marshall, and Calloway;
- (2) Pennyryle Area Development District which shall include the counties of Livingston, Crittenden, Lyon, Caldwell, Hopkins, Muhlenberg, Trigg, Christian and Todd;
- (3) Green River Area Development District which shall include the counties of Union, Henderson, Webster, McLean, Daviess, Ohio and Hancock;
- (4) Barren River Area Development District which shall include the counties of Logan, Simpson, Butler, Warren, Edmonson, Hart, Barren, Allen, Metcalfe and Monroe;
- (5) Lincoln Trail Area Development District which shall include the counties of Breckinridge, Meade, Grayson, Hardin, Larue, Nelson, Washington, and Marion;
- (6) Jefferson Area Development District which shall include the counties of Bullitt, Henry, Jefferson, Oldham, Shelby, Spencer and Trimble;
- (7) Northern Kentucky Area Development District which shall include the counties of Boone, Kenton, Campbell, Carroll, Gallatin, Owen, Grant and Pendleton;
- (8) Buffalo Trace Area Development District which shall include the counties of Bracken, Mason, Robertson, Fleming and Lewis;
- (9) Gateway Area Development District which shall include the counties of Rowan, Bath, Montgomery, Menifee, and Morgan;
- (10) Fivco Area Development District which shall include the counties of Greenup, Boyd, Carter, Elliott, and Lawrence;
- (11) Big Sandy Area Development District which shall include the counties of Johnson, Magoffin, Martin, Floyd, and Pike;
- (12) Kentucky River Area Development District which shall include the counties of Wolfe, Owsley, Lee, Breathitt, Leslie, Perry, Knott, and Letcher;
- (13) Cumberland Valley Area Development District which shall include the counties of Jackson, Rockcastle, Laurel, Clay, Knox, Whitley, Bell, and Harlan;
- (14) Lake Cumberland Area Development District which shall include the counties of Taylor, Adair, Green, Casey, Russell, Pulaski, Clinton, Cumberland, Wayne, and McCreary; and
- (15) Bluegrass Area Development District which shall include the counties of Anderson, Franklin, Woodford, Mercer, Boyle, Lincoln, Garrard, Jessamine, Fayette, Scott, Harrison, Bourbon, Nicholas, Clark, Madison, Powell, and Estill.

147A.060 Board of directors for each district -- Appointment -- Terms – State officers and members of General Assembly may serve only in advisory capacity.

There shall be in each area development district a board of directors. The composition of the board and the terms and appointments of its members in each district shall be specified by administrative regulation promulgated by the Department for Local

Government in accordance with KRS Chapter 13A. The designee of a mayor or county judge/executive shall be a member of the designator's respective legislative body or their staff. Other persons who are not elected officials or members of their staffs may be designated as representatives with the consent of that body. The Department for Local Government, in specifying the composition of the board, shall conform to applicable federal requirements. A person who is a state officer, a deputy state officer, or a member of the General Assembly may serve only in a nonmember advisory capacity to the board of directors of an area development district. An area development district board of directors shall notify legislators of the provisions of this section and of their right to participate in the activities of the area development district. If a legislator chooses to participate in accordance with this section, the area development district shall send meeting notices to that legislator at the same time board members are notified of the meetings.

147A.070 Appointment of executive director -- Election of executive committee, duties -- Advertisement of open positions -- Employees' compensation.

(1) Subject to the requirements of subsection (3) of this section, the board of directors in each district may appoint an executive director and deputy executive director and fix the salary for each position. The executive director shall perform, in the name of the board, such functions and duties and may exercise such authority of the board as the board may delegate to the executive director. The deputy executive director, if one is hired, shall perform such functions and duties as designated by the executive director.

(2) The board of directors in each district may elect from its membership an executive committee and delegate to the committee any of the following duties:

(a) To employ such staff members as may be required for the operations of the district;

(b) To manage the financial assets and obligations of the district;

(c) To guide the activities of the district between meetings of the board; and

(d) To perform such other duties as the board might delegate to it.

(3) On or after June 29, 2017, an open position for the executive director or deputy executive director with an area development district shall be advertised by the board of directors in a manner designed to provide adequate notice of the opening and sufficient time for interested applicants to apply. Advertisement of an open position shall, at a minimum, be published on the Web site of the district and published in accordance with KRS Chapter 424 at a minimum for a period of twenty-one (21) days.

(4) Bonuses, awards, one (1) time salary adjustments, special salary

enhancements, or severance pay for any employee, unless severance pay is provided pursuant to a contract approved by the board, that do not constitute a permanent change in the employee's compensation shall not be made or awarded to any employee of a district.

147A.080 Powers of board of directors.

Each board of directors shall have the power and authority to:

- (1) Adopt and have a common seal and alter the same at pleasure;
- (2) Sue and be sued;
- (3) Adopt bylaws and make rules and regulations for the conduct of its business;
- (4) Make and enter into all contracts or agreements necessary or incidental to the performance of its duties;
- (5) Provide upon request basic administrative, research, and planning services for any planning and development body located within the district;
- (6) Accept, receive, and administer loans, grants, or other funds or gifts from public and private agencies including the Commonwealth and the federal government for the purpose of carrying out the functions of the district;
- (7) Expend such funds as may be considered by it to be advisable or necessary in the performance of its duties;
- (8) Acquire, hold as may be necessary and convenient, encumber, or dispose of real and personal property, except that no board shall have the power of eminent domain;
- (9) Charge fees, rents, and otherwise charge for services provided by the board, except that no board shall have any power to levy taxes;
- (10) Enter into interlocal agreements or interstate compacts to the extent authorized by laws of the Commonwealth. An area development district organization shall be deemed a "public agency" as defined by the Interlocal Cooperation Act in KRS Chapter 65;
- (11) Promote, organize, and advise special districts or other authorities in accordance with laws of the Commonwealth and act as the regional clearinghouse for such programs and projects as prescribed by federal regulation;
- (12) Perform such other and further acts as may be necessary to carry out the duties and responsibilities created by KRS 147A.050 to 147A.120.

147A.090 Duties of board of directors.

Each district board of directors shall have the power, duty, and authority to:

- (1) Establish such functional advisory committees as may be necessary and advisable. These functional advisory committees shall be organized to meet such guidelines as may be required for federal or state assistance;
- (2) Conduct the necessary research and studies and coordinate and cooperate with all appropriate groups and agencies in order to develop, and adopt and

revise, when necessary, a district development plan or series of plans, including, but not limited to, the following districtwide plan elements: goals and objectives; water and sewer; land-use; and open space and recreation. Such plans shall serve as a general guide for public and private actions and decisions to assure the development of public and private property in the most appropriate relationships;

(3) Prepare annually a report of its activities to the cities and counties within the district, the legislature, and the Governor. The board shall make copies of the report available to members of the public within the district;

(4) Comply with the provisions of KRS 65A.010 to 65A.090; and

(5) Cooperate with the Kentucky Mountain Regional Recreation Authority established in KRS 148.0222 for the purpose of establishing, maintaining, and promoting recreational trails to increase economic development, tourism, and outdoor recreation for Kentucky's residents and visitors, not only in eastern Kentucky but throughout the Commonwealth.

147A.100 Allocation of funds.

The Finance and Administration Cabinet shall, subject to the availability of funds, allocate funds to each district for the purpose of carrying out the district's responsibilities and for matching federal and local funds.

147A.110 District projects and property exempt from taxation.

As a public body, no area development district board shall be required to pay taxes or assessments upon any project or upon any property acquired or used by it or upon the income or proceeds therefrom.

History: Created 1972 Ky. Acts ch. 125, sec. 7.

147A.115 Annual reports of receipt and expenditure of state and federal fundings.

(1) By December 31 of each year beginning in 2017, the Cabinet for Health and Family Services and the Education and Workforce Development Cabinet shall, following any year in which the cabinet awarded federal or state funds to an area development district, prepare and submit a detailed report to the Legislative Research Commission and area development district board members. The report shall include the total amount of state and federal funds distributed to each area development district, broken down by funding source and program from the preceding fiscal year.

(2) By December 31 of each year beginning in 2017, each area development district shall, following any year in which the area development district receives

state or federal funds, prepare and submit a detailed report to the Legislative Research Commission and area development board members. The report shall include the following financial information from the preceding fiscal year:

(a) For each allocation, distribution, award, or grant of state or federal funds, the total amount, the percentage of the total amount, and a description of the specific types of expenditures made for or allocated to:

1. Administrative costs;
2. Direct expenditures; and
3. Indirect expenditures;

(b) Allocation, distribution, award, or grant funds not expended, and an explanation of why the funds were not expended;

(c) The total amount of reserves carried forward by the area development district, identification of the source of those funds, and an explanation of why the funds are being carried forward; and

(d) For each program:

1. A list of direct services provided by the district;
2. A list of service providers contracted by the district and the services provided by those providers;
3. The number of eligible persons for the program, number of persons served by the program, and, if applicable, number of people on waiting lists for the program; and
4. The performance measures required by the contract used to evaluate the area development district's actions.

(3) The Legislative Research Commission shall distribute the report to the appropriate interim joint committees and to the budget review subcommittee that has jurisdiction over the Cabinet for Health Family Services or the Education and Workforce Development Cabinet.

147A.116 Required compliance with laws governing open meetings and records, procurement, a code of ethics, conflicts of interest, whistleblower protections, and compensation.

(1) By January 1, 2018, each area development district and any board, committee, or other organization created by an area development district shall:

- (a) Comply with the provisions of KRS 61.870 to 61.884;
- (b) Comply with the provisions of KRS 61.800 to 61.850;
- (c) Comply with state and federal procurement statutes and administrative regulations, as applicable;
- (d) Comply with and be subject to the provisions of KRS 65A.070 by either adopting a code of ethics or abiding by the applicable code of ethics pursuant to KRS 65A.070;
- (e) Adopt policies to address conflicts of interest for employees and board members of the area development districts, which shall include a prohibition on employees and board members having any interest, either direct or indirect, in any contract entered into by the area development district or any agency created by the area development district;

- (f) Be subject to the provisions of KRS 61.101 to 61.103;
- (g) Subject to the provisions of KRS 147A.070(4), adopt, implement, and maintain a detailed and equitable compensation policy for its employees; and
- (h) Establish and maintain an independent process to receive, analyze, investigate and resolve concerns relating to the area development district, including alleged violations of the code of ethics or any of the provisions of this section. The process shall include a monthly reporting requirement to the board members of the area development district of any reported concerns or alleged violations. If the process finds a reasonable likelihood that a violation exists, then that alleged violation shall be reported to the Department for Local Government, the Auditor of Public Accounts, and the Attorney General.

(2) By July 1, 2020, each area development district and any board, committee, or other organization created by an area development district shall provide public access to financial information in compliance with the provisions of KRS 65.312(4).

147A.117 Contract for audit by certified public accountant or firm instead of the Auditor of Public Accounts -- Conditions for.

- (1) No area development district shall enter into any contract with a certified public accountant or firm to perform an audit unless the Auditor of Public Accounts has declined in writing to perform the audit or has failed to respond within thirty (30) days of receipt of a written request. The area development district shall furnish the Auditor of Public Accounts with a comprehensive statement of the scope and nature of the proposed audit. The actual expense of an audit performed by the Auditor of Public Accounts shall be billed to the audited area development district.
- (2) Any contract with a certified public accountant or firm entered into as a result of the Auditor of Public Accounts either declining to perform the audit or failing to respond within thirty (30) days of receipt of a written request for an audit shall specify the following:
 - (a) That the certified public accountant shall forward a copy of the audit report and management letters to the Auditor of Public Accounts for review;
 - (b) That the Auditor of Public Accounts shall have the right to review the certified public accountant or firm's work papers before and after the release of the audit; and
 - (c) That after review of the certified public accountant or firm's work papers, should discrepancies be found, the Auditor of Public Accounts shall notify the audited entity of the discrepancies. If the certified public accountant or firm does not correct these discrepancies prior to the release of the audit, the Auditor of Public Accounts may conduct its own audit to verify the findings of the certified public accountant's report.
- (3) If an audit verifying the findings of the certified public accountant or firm's report is conducted by the Auditor of Public Accounts, the actual expense of the audit shall be billed to the area development district.

147A.120 Limitation on districts' functions, powers and duties.

Nothing in KRS 147A.050 to 147A.120 shall be deemed to limit or authorize the limitation in any manner of the functions, powers, or duties of any department or agency of the Commonwealth or of any political subdivision. Nor shall anything in KRS 147A.050 to 147A.120 authorize the Finance and Administration Cabinet or an area development district to perform or discharge any powers, duties, or functions now reposed, or which may hereinafter be reposed, by law in the Kentucky Department of Education, local school districts, or other educational institutions.

147A.125 Regional planning council.

(1) Except as set forth in subsection (8) of this section, each area development district shall establish a regional planning council to act in an advisory capacity on planning matters throughout the district.

(2) The regional planning council shall be composed of one (1) representative from each planning unit in the area development district. Each representative shall be appointed annually by the planning commission of each planning unit in the district. To be eligible for appointment to the council, a person shall be a member of the planning commission, or the planning commission's professional staff.

(3) At its first regular meeting in each year, the council shall elect from its membership a president and vice president. The vice president shall have the authority to act as president of the council during the absence or disability of the president.

(4) The council shall meet at the call of the president, but at least quarterly in each year.

(5) To insure compatible treatment of planned development throughout the district, the council may review comprehensive plans of planning units within the district for regional impact, may develop regional transportation, infrastructure, and land use plans for the district, and may make recommendations regarding the regional impact of proposed comprehensive plans and plan amendments of planning units within the district.

(6) The area development district shall provide staff and technical support as requested by the council. Existing land use planning services and functions of the area development district shall be placed under the direction and control of the council.

(7) The council may offer training and education opportunities in the area of planning and zoning matters to planning commission members and staff in the district.

(8) The requirements of this section shall not apply to any area development district in which fifty percent (50%) or more of the population resides in cities or counties which participate in a regional planning authority, council of governments, or other agency which is authorized to perform regional planning functions as described in this section.

147A.140 District preparation of solid waste management plan.

In addition to its other powers, each area development district may prepare a solid waste management plan emphasizing regional alternatives for reduction, collection, transportation, and disposal for a local government which authorizes the preparation of the plan, but shall not have authority to implement the area plan.

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REAL ID licenses available at new regional licensing office in Madisonville

Office will serve all Kentucky residents

FRANKFORT, Ky. (March 2, 2020) – Western Kentucky residents now have one more option to maintain U.S. air travel and military base entry thanks to the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet’s (KYTC) expansion of REAL ID-compliant card access at a new Madisonville issuance location.

The Hopkins County REAL ID Regional Driver’s Licensing office in Madisonville launched today serving all Kentuckians regardless of where they live. Any U.S. citizen or permanent resident who has a driver’s license, permit or identification card may apply for a Kentucky’s REAL ID-compliant version at the new regional office in Madisonville if they want to use a state-issued credential to meet upcoming REAL ID requirements that go into effect Oct. 1, 2020.

“After years of repeated changes and uncertainty surrounding REAL ID in Kentucky, my administration is working tirelessly and has made quick progress to make REAL IDs available as soon as possible,” said Gov. Andy Beshear. “The

deadline to comply is quickly approaching and we must continue to improve this service while encouraging Kentuckians to take action to ensure they have an accepted form of identification by October.”

Residents who already have a valid form of REAL ID, like a passport or military ID, can use that instead of the new REAL ID license if they want to visit military bases and fly within the U.S. starting this October. Current driver’s licenses will continue to remain valid for driving, voting and general identification purposes.

Like Madisonville, the REAL ID office in Frankfort serves as a regional application site welcoming applicants from any county to apply. Offices in Paducah, Bowling Green, and Somerset are best scaled to serve residents in the county they are located in and will serve the region once workstation capacity expands.

BACKGROUND ON REAL ID

WHAT IS A REAL ID LICENSE

Starting Oct. 1, 2020, Kentucky driver’s licenses, permits and identification cards displaying the Kentucky Unbridled Spirit logo or the language “NOT FOR REAL ID PURPOSES” will no longer be accepted to board U.S. commercial flights or access restricted federal buildings to comply with federal REAL ID law.

Kentucky is in the process of offering REAL ID-compliant licenses, permits and identification cards accepted at airport security checkpoints, military bases and federal buildings that require ID once federal enforcement begins.

REAL ID licenses serve as one of several forms of REAL ID. Below is a list of common forms of REAL ID Kentuckians may use to maintain air travel and select federal building access:

- Valid U.S. or foreign passport
- Valid U.S. Passport Card
- Voluntary Travel ID license, permit or identification card
- Military ID (issued by U.S. Department of Defense)
- Permanent resident card
- DHS- Trusted Traveler Card
- Global Entry Card

Kentuckians are encouraged to contact military bases and federal buildings, like the White House, to learn what other forms of identification are accepted.

WHY YOU MAY NEED A REAL ID

Beginning nationwide on Oct. 1, 2020, a form of REAL ID will be needed to:

- Pass through airport security checkpoints to board a U.S. commercial flight
- Visit a military base
- Visit a federal building or facility that requires ID (White House, nuclear power plant)

WHERE TO GET A REAL ID LICENSE, PERMIT OR IDENTIFICATION CARD

Kentucky residents may visit the KYTC REAL ID Regional Driver's Licensing Office office located at 56 Federal Place in Madisonville. The office is open from 8 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. Applicants will receive a temporary 30-day document that serves as a driving credential until the permanent card arrives in the mail at the applicant's residence.

Only debit and credit cards will be accepted (**no cash or check**). Regional offices are not equipped to serve applicants who require testing or re-testing. The cost of a four-year REAL ID license is \$24 and \$48 for an eight-year REAL ID license.

WHAT YOU WILL NEED TO APPLY FOR A REAL ID LICENSE

Residents applying for a REAL ID license **must present documentation from a [list of specific, acceptable documents that meet federal guidelines](#)**, including:

- one **(1) valid proof of identity** (like a certified birth certificate or valid passport)
- one **(1) valid proof of social security number** (like a social security card or W2 statement) and
- **two (2) valid proofs of residency** (like a Kentucky driver's license with your current home address or a utility bill dated less than 61 days).
- Additional documentation may be required if an applicant's name or gender doesn't match on the four proof documents (like a marriage certificate or divorce decree if your names don't match due to marriage or divorce). Applicants may need to reorder documents before applying if the documents do not display legal names (like a nickname printed on a social security card). A detailed list of acceptable documents and examples of when additional documentation may be required is available on the Confident Kentucky [website](#). The online IDocument Guide quiz provides a customized list of documents an applicant will need to present. Some acceptable documents have strict requirements (e., no photocopies of birth certificates, no expired documents, no laminated social security cards).

WHAT IF YOU WANT A REAL ID BUT AREN'T WITHIN YOUR RENEWAL WINDOW (six months before the current card's expiration date)

- Apply for a REAL ID license for \$15, bring in the required documentation and the expiration date of your new license will stay the same
- Once you have a REAL ID license and are within your renewal window, visit a REAL ID regional licensing office to renew your card for four or eight years. You do not need to bring in documentation again unless your name or address has changed.

WHEN TO VISIT THE HOPKINS COUNTY CIRCUIT COURT CLERK OFFICE

The Hopkins County Circuit Court Clerk office will continue to serve as the application site for standard, non-REAL ID-compliant driver's licenses, permits and identification cards. A standard driver's license is \$20.

Kentuckians who have never had a Kentucky driving credential or those who require any form of testing or retesting must first visit the Circuit Court Clerk Office before visiting a regional licensing office if they would like a REAL ID license, permit or identification card.

About the REAL ID Initiative

The Kentucky Transportation Cabinet (KYTC) is spearheading a statewide effort to improve the security of the issuance and production of state-issued driver's licenses, permits and IDs to meet federal REAL ID standards. When REAL ID enforcement goes into effect Oct. 1, 2020, Kentucky driving and ID credentials without a star cutout in a black circle in the upper-right corner cannot be used at airport security checkpoints for U.S. commercial air travel or to visit military bases and federal facilities that require ID (like the White House). Kentuckians 18 years of age or older will need a REAL ID-compliant license/permit/identification card **or**

another acceptable form of REAL ID (like an unexpired passport, passport card, permanent resident card) to fly within the U.S. or access restricted federal locations. Passports are still required for international travel. REAL ID licenses are optional and will continue to be offered after Oct. 1, 2020. Circuit Court Clerk offices will serve as the application site for standard, non-compliant cards and KYTC regional office locations will accept requests for REAL IDs*. All REAL ID licenses, permits and identification cards will arrive in the mail, are available in four or eight-year lifespans, feature new pricing and require documentation when applying. FY 2021 Appropriations Process Begins

Following the recent release of the [President's budget request](#), House appropriators have begun laying the groundwork for the FY 2021 appropriations process. House appropriators plan to begin subcommittee markups for FY 2021 spending bills in late April and intend to wrap up full committee markups by late May. The Senate Appropriations Committee typically begins its appropriations process later than the House. Senate Appropriations Committee Chairman Richard Shelby has stated that he hopes to complete Senate appropriations markups before the August recess.

OMB Super Circular Webinar Recording Now Available

Last week, NADO hosted a webinar briefing on new updates related to the “*Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards*,” commonly known as the “OMB Super Circular,” and the public comment period that is currently open until **March 23, 2020**. During the webinar, guest speaker Bob Lloyd provided an overview of the [Notice of Proposed Rulemaking \(NPRM\)](#) that was announced in the Federal Register on January 22. NADO is currently preparing a response to the NPRM comprised of recommendations and feedback derived from NADO member input. EDA Announces Redesign of the Regional Innovation Strategies Program

The Economic Development Administration (EDA) has announced a redesign of its Regional Innovation Strategies (RIS) program, now called Build to Scale (B2S). With a 40 percent budget increase and recent reauthorization, the redesign of the RIS program modernizes the branding and language of RIS to better reflect the spirit of the entrepreneurial communities that the program serves; increases exposure of the program and encourages applications from underserved communities; and creates a more “customer-friendly” Notice of Funding Opportunity that will lead to better stakeholder engagement. To date, this program has awarded \$100 million in grants across the country that have been matched by more than \$115 million in community funding for 224 projects. New Report on Broadband Access in Rural America Published by NACo in Partnership with NADO and Other Key Partners

In 2019, NADO joined as a partner in the “Bridging the Economic Divide” Initiative, which is led by the National Association of Counties (NACo) in partnership with the Rural Community Assistance Partnership (RCAP), the Rural Local Initiatives Support Corporation (Rural LISC), the Farm Credit Council, Land O'Lakes, Inc., and NADO. This group of partners has been working together to address the critical need for affordable high-speed internet connectivity in rural communities across the country. The initiative aims to improve access to reliable, high-speed internet by developing a mobile app designed to identify areas with low or no connectivity.

This partnership has culminated in the release of a new report:

[*Understanding the True State of Connectivity in America*](#), published by NACo in partnership with NADO and other partners. The report discusses the data collected through the TestIT app on internet connectivity. Data from the app shows that nearly 60 percent of counties experience fixed wireless internet speeds slower than the standard. Lack of reliable broadband is a major barrier to socioeconomic opportunity, education, health, and overall quality of life. Access to high-speed internet is also consistently voiced as a top challenge facing small businesses in rural America and stifles entrepreneurship by limiting the ability of individuals to take on independent work. 

Grant Funding Opportunities Available

The application period will open soon for the Land and Water Conservation Fund, Recreational Trails Program, and Recycling and Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) Management Grants Program. Cities, counties, state and federal agencies are eligible to apply for funds under these programs.

The **Recycling and Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) Management Grants Program** is funded by the Kentucky Division of Waste Management. The funds are to develop an integrated recycling infrastructure, manage Household Hazardous Waste and provide recycling and HHW public education programs. Any county, waste management district, city, urban-county government or other political subdivision of the state or any combination of the above, including school districts, shall be eligible to apply. The grant is a 75/25 match grant. **Applications are due on April 1, 2020.**

The **Recreational Trails Program (RTP)** is funded by the Federal Highway Administration. It can be used to provide assistance for acquisition of easements, development and/or maintenance of recreational trails and trailhead facilities for both motorized and non-motorized use. The RTP benefits communities and enhances quality of life. All trails that receive money under this program must remain open to the public and maintained for perpetuity. The minimum request under this program is \$25,000 and the maximum is \$250,000. The RTP is an 80/20 matching reimbursement program. **Applications are due on May 1, 2020.**

The **Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF)** provides federal grant funds to protect important natural areas, acquire land for outdoor recreation and to develop or renovate public outdoor recreation facilities such as campgrounds, picnic areas, sports and playfields, swimming facilities, boating facilities, fishing facilities, trails, natural areas and passive parks. The minimum request is \$25,000 and the maximum is \$250,000. The LWCF is a 50/50 matching reimbursement program. **Applications are due on May 29, 2020.**

2020 Delta Regional Authority (DRA) States' Economic Development Assistance Program (SEDAP)

The DRA federal funding program is only available to participating member states, local governments (city and county), public bodies, and non-profit entities. Private/For-Profit entities are NOT eligible for DRA funding.

Applicants must clearly demonstrate how a project meets at least one Federal Priority Eligibility Criteria and one DRA Regional Development Plan Goal and must assure sustainability of the project after DRA funding.

Eligible Activities

1. Basic Public Infrastructure – water and wastewater facilities, electric and gas utilities, broadband delivery and solid waste landfills, all of which are fundamental services necessary to sustain and promote growth and/or attract business.

Medicare Beneficiaries

Are you currently receiving Medicare and paying for your Part B monthly premium? If so, there is a program that may be able to assist you with that premium cost. If your income is under \$1,357/single or \$1,827/married and your resources/assets are under \$7,390/single or \$11,090/married then you may qualify to receive assistance through the state with a program called the Medicare Savings Program. This program may help pay for your Part B premiums and *potentially* assist in also paying for Part A premiums, deductibles, coinsurance, and copayments, depending on your income level. During Fiscal Year 2019, there were 58,577 congregate meals served in the Pennyriple Region. The congregate meals are served Monday through Friday at all 9 senior citizen centers. The congregate meals are provided at no charge, with donations encouraged, for individuals 60 years of age and over. The congregate meals are delicious and provide 1/3 of the RDI (recommended daily intake). The congregate meals are a major component of the senior center services, but there is so much more to the senior centers. Participating at a senior center gives individuals the opportunity for socialization and participation in a wide variety of senior center activities including billiards, playing cards, Bible study, Bingo, health promotion classes, exercise classes, cornhole, games, themed parties, dances and so much more.
