SEPTEMBER 14, 2020 AT 1:00 P.M.

- I. **CALL TO ORDER:** Judge Perry Newcom, Board Chair, called the meeting to order at 1:07 p.m. and recognized a voting quorum. Due to the current State of Emergency regarding threats to public health presented by the novel coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic, this meeting was conducted by videoconference (Zoom).
- II. **PLEDGE/INVOCATION:** Mayor Jan Yonts led the pledge and Judge Perry Newcom led the invocation.
- III. **MINUTES:** Minutes of the August 10, 2020 Board Meeting were presented for review and approval. A copy was included in the online board packet and a copy is attached to and made a part of these minutes. There were no questions or concerns. **Motion** made by Judge Todd Mansfield to approve the August 10, 2020 minutes as presented. Mr. Gary Jones seconded the motion and the motion carried.
- IV. **APPROVAL OF FINANCIAL REPORT:** Ms. Crissy Carter, PADD Board Treasurer, presented the August 31, 2020 Monthly Expenditure Report for review and approval. A copy was included in the online board packet and a copy is attached to and made a part of these minutes. Overall, line items are within budget (16.67% vs 14.4%). Total Personnel is \$459,604.83 (14.42% of budget); Total Travel is \$30.11 (.01% of budget) and is low due to COVID19 travel restrictions and reflects a negative balance of (\$201.05) due to reimbursement of conference deposits for conferences that were canceled; Total Operating Expenses are \$135,256.10.72 (18.93% of budget) and slightly exceed budget due to payment of membership fees, which is the nature of this line item and will level out. Total Expenditures are \$594,891.04 (14.40% of budget) year-to-date. There were no questions or concerns. **Motion** made by Mr. Roger Simpson to approve the financial report as presented. Ms. Lori Harper seconded the motion and the motion carried.
- V. **FEDERAL AND STATE REPORTS:**
 1. U.S. Senator Rand Paul/Jason Hasert – Mr. Jason Hasert, Field Representative, stated Senator Paul remains focused on ways to reopen the economy and getting the schools opened up statewide safely. Senator Paul remains committed to seeing the U.S. Government have a balanced budget and funds to help people, move forward with infrastructure projects in the region, and Fort Campbell. There were no questions or concerns.
 2. U.S. Congressman James Comer/Corey Elder – Mr. Corey Elder, Field Representative, reported Congressman Comer continues to stay busy with the Oversight Committee and you can follow the Congressman on Facebook and Twitter to keep up to date on activity. If you have projects that are delayed in D.C., please contact their office and they will try to help speed up that process if possible. There were no questions or concerns.

3. KY Secretary of State/Michael G. Adams – Secretary of State Michael G. Adams provided information regarding the General election voting options and highlighted changes to include an increased number of voting locations, Saturday voting hours, and expedited results on election night. He stated Congress deserves credit in authorizing funds needed to cover PPE and equipment costs to expanded the voting process for success as it is a very expensive process. You can visit govoteky.com to learn more about your options on how to cast your vote in the November General Election. He encouraged everyone to be sure to vote. There were no questions or concerns.
4. U.S. Senator Mitch McConnell/Morgan Alvey – Ms. Morgan Alvey, Field Representative, expressed congratulations to Todd and Logan Counties who received \$13.5M in grant funding last week. Senator McConnell was in Christian County on September 2 to visit with leaders at Fort Campbell and Jennie Stuart Health. Unfortunately, last week the COVID-19 relief bill did not pass; however, the Senator will continue his efforts in this area. There were no questions or concerns.
5. KY State Representative Chris Freeland – KY State Representative Chris Freeland reported Interim Committees continue to meet and discuss upcoming legislation and concerns regarding the 70,000 unprocessed unemployment insurance claims. He was excited to hear Gov. Beshear’s announcement that five Kentucky Riverports, to include Eddyville Riverport, will receive \$450,000 for repairs and equipment replacements. There were no questions or concerns.
6. Kentucky Transportation Cabinet DO2/Deneatra Henderson – no report.
7. KYTC Department for Rural & Municipal Aid/Doug Taylor – Mr. Doug Taylor, KYTC Department for Rural & Municipal Aid, reported county road & municipal aid distributions should have been received in the Pennyrile ADD district; however, if you have not received yours, please let him know. We are in the process of reviewing Flex fund requests and 80/20 bridge requests and hope to have those finalized mid – October; if you have a specific project that is climate sensitive and needs to be expedited before paving season is over, please let him know. There were no questions or concerns.
8. Department for Local Government/Elton Thomas – no report.

VI. REPORTS:

1. Community & Economic Development – Mr. Craig Morris, PADD Regional Planning Coordinator, gave a slide presentation overview of the State Physical Activity and Nutrition (SPAN) Grant. A copy of the slide presentation was included in the online board packet and a copy is attached to and made a part of these minutes. Mr. Morris stated the purpose of the grant is to develop bike and walking trail master plans that focus on developing multi-use trails. The state wants each County Health Department to contract with the ADD’s to develop these master plans. There were no questions or concerns.
2. Area Agency on Aging & Independent Living – Ms. Jill Collins, Director, Pennyrile AAAIL, reviewed the current Aging Waiting List per county; a copy was included in the online board packet and a copy is attached to and made a part of these minutes. Ms. Collins provided a Pennyrile AAAIL Meals update; a copy was included in the online board packet and a copy is attached to and made a part of these minutes. Senior Citizen Centers remain closed except for providing curbside pick-up congregate meals and in home services. They recently started providing drive through flu shots in each county. Information is provided on social media and at the centers. Medicare open enrollment will begin soon and will be conducted either via telephone or virtually. Individuals can contact benefit counselors at the Senior Citizen Centers to make those arrangements. We are partnering with University of Louisville Training Institute on a number of pilot projects (i.e. virtual friendly visitor programs, virtual contacts with veterans needing palliative care, and clients with a cancer diagnosis). More information will be forthcoming. There were no questions or concerns.

Mr. Payton Kidd, Participated Directed Services Coordinator, provided information regarding the number of active and pending cases in the PDS-HCB Waiver Program, Traditional HCB Waiver Program and the Veterans Directed Care Program. A summary was provided in the online board packet and a copy is attached to and made a part of these minutes. All programs have seen substantial growth with little interruptions. Of the six wavier programs in KY, the Home & Community Based (HCB) Waiver Program is the largest with 11,000 participants and a waiting list of zero. Mr. Kidd reported as part of the 21st Century Cures Act passed in 2016, a new mandate requires five of six 1915C waiver programs in KY to utilize a new software application, Electronic Visit Verification (EVV), which eliminates the need for paper documents, provides flexibility in scheduling & service delivery, monitoring of safety and health, reduction in potential Medicaid fraud, and prevention of waste and abusive services. This mandate impacts 60,000 paid employees across state of KY. Non-compliance would result in a loss of federal funding, which is 70% of those programs. Provided in the online board packet is a letter to Congress expressing concerns in implementing such a major change in the midst of a pandemic and is recommending a delay no less than 6 months to January 1, 2021 or when the pandemic ends. We will keep you informed of changes. There were no questions or concerns.

3. West Kentucky Workforce – Ms. Sheila Clark, WKWB Director, reported Career Centers remain closed to the public, but continue to conduct business via cellphone or email to verify eligibility for programs, on-the-job training contracts, or enrollment in our youth programs. We are proceeding with grants we have in place for the Youth programs and COVID-19 Employment Recovery Opportunity. We continue to work to transition pieces of programs (employment service activities, trade activities, CDO) from the Education and Workforce Cabinet to the Labor Cabinet and developing policy for them. The Labor Market Snapshot for July 2019-2020 was provided in the online board packet; a copy is attached to and made a part of these minutes. There were no questions or concerns.

Ms. Julie Allen, Workforce Programs Coordinator, shared information on the Youth programs. Informational flyers regarding programs was provided in the online board packet and a copy is attached to and made a part of these minutes. Recruiting continues to help individuals through the COVID-19 National Dislocated Workers Grant that provides on-the-job training to those who lost their jobs or were laid off during the pandemic. Short-term training is available at any of our community colleges that offer short term (3 month) certificates; upon completion, individuals go straight into the workforce and employers are eligible for reimbursement. For more information or questions, please contact her. There were no questions or concerns.

Mr. Tom Sholar, Workforce Business Liaison, reported we currently have three individuals being served through the Emergency Recovery grant that were hired by local industries. If an industry has a workforce reduction related to COVID, they can receive a 50% wage reimbursement for a specified number of hours, for eligible individuals they hire. We continue to be busy fielding questions and providing assistance. For questions or more information, please contact him. There were no questions or concerns.

VII. NEW BUSINESS:

1. KCADD – Mr. Tony Wilder, KCADD Executive Director, expressed his gratitude to the ADD's and the excellent job their staff and directors are doing across the state of Kentucky during the pandemic. We are looking forward to the upcoming legislative session as the ADD Council and ADD Directors will be working on legislative priorities
2. Monthly Code of Ethics Report – Judge Newcom, Board Chair, stated no violations have been reported during the month. Informational; no action required.

3. Broadband Resolution – Judge Newcom, Board Chair, presented a Resolution (2022-02) on behalf of Pennyriple Area Development District in support of Kenergy Corporation’s efforts to engage in the development and financing of broadband infrastructure and activities throughout the region, specifically in rural areas, that are not currently allowed by the Public Service Commission (PSC). A copy of the resolution was provided in the online board packet and a copy is attached to and made a part of these minutes. There were no questions or concerns. **Motion** made by Judge Todd Mansfield to approve Resolution 2020-02 as presented. Mayor Jan Yonts seconded the motion and the motion carried.
4. West KY Coalition - Judge Newcom, Board Chair, stated information was distributed at last month’s board meeting regarding the formation of the West KY Coalition. Their first meeting will be held on September 23, 2020 at the Ballard Convention Center in Madisonville, KY at 10:00 a.m. CT. There were no questions or concerns.
5. Director’s Report – Mr. Vincent provided the following report:
 - PADD Executive Committee – the PADD Executive Committee met on August 18, 2020 and a copy of the meeting minutes was provided in the online board packet; a copy is attached to and made a part of these minutes. The committee selected Chris Sutton to be hired as the new Disaster Recovery/Resiliency Coordinator. The committee also reviewed and approved two loans: 1) Marion Hardwoods, Inc., Crittenden County, and 2) Strader Farms, LLC, Todd County, which is the first COVID Relief funded loan.
 - IGR Report – a copy of the IGR Report was included in the online board packet; a copy is attached to and made a part of these minutes. For questions, please contact Amy Frogue at 270-886-9484.
 - Neighborhood Stabilization Program (NSP) – Ten years ago, Pennyriple ADD purchased ten foreclosed homes in Hopkinsville and Oak Grove to renovate and resell. The last home was sold earlier this month and board approval is required to close the program and checking account accordingly. **Motion** made by Mr. Gary Jones to close the NSP Program and associated checking account. Mayor Jan Yonts seconded the motion and the motion carried.
 - Milestone Service Recognition – Belinda Babb, National Family Caregiver Program Coordinator, and Cheri Farmer, PADD Executive Assistant, are celebrating milestone years of service this month. Belinda is celebrating five years of service and Cheri Farmer is celebrating ten years of service. We appreciate all they do. Congratulations.
 - Pride of the Pennyriple – after numerous discussions with Lake Barkley State Resort Park staff and several of our Economic Development folks, the difficult decision has been made not to move forward with this year’s annual Pride of the Pennyriple Business & Industry Appreciation Event. We hope to be able to hold the event sometime in the Spring of 2021.
 - COVID Compliant Workplace - Pennyriple ADD has been designated as a COVID-19 Compliant Workplace. The Christian County Health Department inspected our facility and healthy at work practices and recognized us as contributing to the health and safety of our community. We continue to work at 50% capacity in the office; staff work at least three days in the office and two days remotely - on a rotating basis.

VIII. OTHER BUSINESS: None

IX. ADJOURN: With no further business, **Motion** was made by Judge Todd Mansfield to adjourn the meeting at 2:30 p.m. Ms. JoAnn Holder seconded the motion and the motion carried.

Desc.: ***Updated scope since SSES has been completed: The project will rehab approximately 8,000 LF of 8" and 6" sewer line by CIPP lining and will replace approximately 42 LF of 8" sewer line by dig and replace. The line rehab will be scattered throughout the City along the following streets: East Walnut St, East Hall St, Oak Hts, Elaine Dr, School St, Water St, Cook St, East Munn St, Mineral St, Poplar St, Hickory St, Depot St, Park Ave, and South Main St. In addition, approximately 90 manhole repairs will be made including raising castings, replacing covers, and other rehabilitation along with approximately 45 point repairs on sewer lines throughout the system. The project will also install 5 new manholes and make 140 service line connections or service line repairs. The WWTP portion of the project includes clarifier improvements, bar screen and scrapper mechanism replacement, grit removal equipment, and cleaning and repair of the effluent line. The result of this project will improve sewer lines and reduce I & I. The project will also correct several SSO's that have occurred near the WWTP, at the intersection of South Trim St and West Ramsey St, and at the intersection of South Main St and Water St.*

***Original Scope: The City of Dawson Springs is proposing a two-prong approach to solving the problems that exist within the wastewater system: collection system improvements and WWTP improvements. The collection system improvements portion of the project involves an SSES investigation phase that includes flow monitoring, smoke testing, and cctv inspection, followed by a rehabilitation (construction) phase based on the results of the investigative phase. The WWTP portion of the project includes clarifier improvements, bar screen and scrapper mechanism replacement, grit removal equipment, and cleaning and repair of the effluent line. The result of this project will improve sewer lines and reduce I & I. The project will also correct several SSO's that have occurred ne*





LWA Unemployment Rates (August 2019 – August 2020)





LEGISLATIVE NEWS

House Passes EDA Revolving Loan Fund Defederalization Legislation

On Thursday October 1, the U.S. House of Representatives passed the *Reinvigorating Lending for the Future (RLF) Act of 2020* ([S. 4075](#) and [H.R. 7388](#)). Having already been passed in the U.S. Senate on August 6, the bill has now been sent to the President's desk for his signature. This legislation reforms the U.S. Department of Commerce Economic Development Administration's (EDA) Revolving Loan Fund (RLF) program by eliminating burdensome "in perpetuity" reporting requirements and releasing the federal interest in EDA RLFs after seven years, providing more local flexibility to EDA RLF operators as they administer the program on behalf of their communities. NADO is grateful to all the NADO members, coalition partners, and other advocates who engaged members of Congress and helped advocate for this reform, as well as the Senate and House champions who introduced and supported this legislation, and the Congressional staffers who helped facilitate the process.

Stopgap Spending Bill Signed into Law

A [stopgap spending bill](#) (H.R. 8337) was signed into law last week that will keep the government funded at FY 2020 spending levels through December 11, 2020. The spending measure also includes a one-year extension of the FAST Act, the existing surface transportation authorization bill; a reauthorization of the National Flood Insurance Program through September 2021; and measures that allow for enhanced FEMA disaster relief activities, among other provisions. Congress now has two more months during which to either pass the twelve appropriations bills that must be enacted to fully fund the government for the remainder of FY 2021 or to pass an additional continuing resolution.

COVID-19 Relief Prospects Remain Unclear

COVID-19 relief negotiations were renewed last week as Speaker of the House Nancy Pelosi and Treasury Secretary Steven Mnuchin reconvened for in-person meetings. However, a bipartisan deal did not emerge from last week's negotiations. Since a compromise was not reached, the House moved ahead with a vote and passed a revised version of a coronavirus aid package with an estimated cost of \$2.2 trillion. The House-passed relief measure primarily reflects Democratic priorities and is not expected to be taken up in the Senate.

The overall cost of another COVID-19 relief package remains one of the key areas of contention. Earlier this week, President Trump [stated that](#) he was directing negotiators to conclude relief talks until after the November election, but later [expressed support](#) for targeted relief focused on specific measures such as airlines, Paycheck Protection Program loans for small businesses, and stimulus checks for Americans. Pelosi and Mnuchin are [continuing discussions](#) this week.

PADD BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING

The PADD Board of Directors held their monthly meeting via Zoom on Monday, September 14, 2020 at 1:00 p.m. (CDT). Federal/State reports were provided by agency representatives. Secretary of State Michael G. Adams was an honored guest and provided information regarding Primary election voting options and highlighted changes to include an increased number of voting locations, Saturday voting hours, and expedited results on election night. You can visit govoteky.com to learn more about your options on how to cast your vote in the November Primary Election. State Representative Chris Freeland reported Interim Committees continue to meet and discuss upcoming legislation and concerns regarding the 70,000 unprocessed unemployment insurance claims. He was excited to hear Gov. Beshear's announcement that five Kentucky Riverports, to include Eddyville Riverport, will receive \$450,000 for repairs and equipment replacements.

Craig Morris, PADD Regional Planning Coordinator, gave a slide presentation regarding the State Physical Activity & Nutrition Grant (SPAN) that will provide funds for County Health Departments to contract with the Area Development Districts throughout the state to develop Master Bike and Walking Trail plans. Updates were also provided by Pennyrile AAAL and West KY Workforce.

The Board of Directors approved a resolution on behalf of Pennyrile Area Development District to support Kenergy Corporation's request for a waiver from the Public Service Commission to allow them to engage in the development and financing of broadband activities in rural areas. Jason Vincent, PADD Executive Director, provided updates and announced all ten homes in the Neighborhood Stabilization Program, initiated 10 years ago, have finally been sold and the Board approved a motion to close the program and checking account. The annual Pride of the Pennyrile Industry Appreciation event at Lake Barkley State Resort Park has unfortunately been canceled this year; depending on COVID-19 mandates, the event could possibly be rescheduled for Spring of 2021. PADD was recently recognized and certified by the Christian County Health Department as a COVID-19 Compliant Business.

COMMUNITY & ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Delta Regional Authority Announces \$4.7 Million Investment into Kentucky Communities

The Delta Regional Authority and Governor Andy Beshear, together with their federal and local-based partners, awarded funds to six projects in the Pennyrile Area Development District. The City of Greenville received funding for wastewater infrastructure improvements in the amount of \$1,094,800. This project will provide improvements to the Powderly wastewater treatment plant to provide adequate wastewater treatment services for existing and future businesses and residents.



The Todd Regional Water Commission was awarded funds to update its primary intake backup generator to improve services to the approximate 27,408 families it serves.

The City of Madisonville received funding to construct a 22,000 square foot hangar at the Madisonville Regional Airport to accommodate an aviation training program through Madisonville Community College.

The Trigg County Hospital was awarded \$105,000 to renovate its medical facility to create additional patient rooms and staff facilities to improve its medical services.

Helping Hands Health Clinic Inc., dba Blount Health Care received funding in the amount of \$42,000 to purchase equipment for an additional general dentistry workstation located in the City of Elkton.

Hopkins County Fiscal Court received \$155,500 in funds to add five broadband communication sites to improve broadband services to the residents and businesses of the southern portion of Hopkins County.

PeADD COVID-19 Business Relief Working Capital Loan Program



Beginning on July 1, 2020, the Pennyriple Area Development District will offer a working capital loan program to support local small businesses impacted by COVID-19. Utilizing additional Economic Development Administration Revolving Loan Funds, the PeADD Board of Directors approved using these additional funds for loans ranging from \$5,000 to \$25,000. These loans can be used to meet short-term working capital needs such as payroll, rent, utilities, interest payments, supplies, inventory management, and/or payments to suppliers.

Businesses must be located within one of the Pennyriple counties to be eligible to apply: Caldwell, Christian, Crittenden, Hopkins, Livingston, Lyon, Muhlenberg, Todd and Trigg. Loan terms include a maximum of 36 months, with an optional six (6) month deferral from the date of loan closure. Interest rates will range from 0.5% to 2.44%. No closing fees will be charged unless appraisal or title work is required. The business does have to provide any available collateral and show an ability to repay the loan. Applications will be accepted until the funds are exhausted, or until June 30, 2022.

Priority will be given to projects that have the greatest impact on employment. Additionally, projects should be in the industrial, commercial, agricultural, and service sectors. Businesses that have received a loan through the SBA Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) or Economic Injury Disaster Loan (EIDL) for the same activity are not eligible to apply for this program. 

Medicare Beneficiaries!

Are you currently receiving Medicare and paying for your Part B monthly premium? If so, there is a program that may be able to assist you with that premium cost. If your income is under \$1,456/single or \$1,960/married and your resources/assets are under \$7,860/single or \$11,800/married then you may qualify to receive assistance through the state with a program called the Medicare Savings Program. This program may help pay for your Part B premiums and *potentially* assist in also paying for Part A premiums, deductibles, coinsurance, and copayments, depending on your income level.
