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Kentucky faces a severe shortage of skilled workers and falls below the national average in workforce participation. *Filling Kentucky Jobs: A KET Forum*, airing Monday, Nov. 13 at 8/7 pm on KET, spotlights Kentucky's need for a well-trained labor force and highlights programs across the state addressing workforce issues.
