A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR REBECCA

Dear Church Family,

I've been doing some thinking and reading about Lent. It is a season in which we are invited to prepare our hearts to remember Christ's death and resurrection. One of the ways we can prepare is to surrender something for the these 40 days that will remind us of the way Jesus surrendered his life for us. If the Holy Spirit does bring something to our mind that distracts us from our relationship with God, then that might be the thing we are being invited to surrender. The purpose is not to persuade God that we are earnest, so He will love us more. Rather, it is to become more aware of God's love for us as we endeavor to respond in self-giving love. In *Silencio: Reflective Practices for Nurturing Your Soul*, I came across a quote by Martin L. Smith, SSJE. *"What we are called to give up in Lent is control itself… and lay down (surrender) my resistance to the One who loves me infinitely more than I can guess, the One who is more on my side than I am myself."* This is a question we could bring to God in prayer, asking Him to reveal where we are resisting intimacy with Him.

I've noticed that God is much more patient than I am. So I think that my invitation for Lent is to embrace patience every single day. It will include choosing to be patient with a renovation process that is taking longer than I expected. I will ask God to help me be patient with interruptions that prevent me from accomplishing my plans for the day. To draw closer to God's sense of timing, I will need the Holy Spirit to enable me to be patient with people who see things differently than I do. I want to be a good listener, both to God and to other people. That takes time and patience too. I'm pretty sure that I will also need to be patient with myself in all of this, because I've got some growing to do in this fruit of the Spirit.

I think there may be a spiritual practice or two that will help me to remember this intention through this season of Lent. The practices aren't an end in themselves, but they can be helpful as they give us a structure to lean into as we seek to draw close to God's heart. I hope that you'll feel God's invitation especially designed for you and that you'll choose to accept it.
