A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR REBECCA

Dear Church Family,

This year has been challenging every one of us to be adaptable. There are widespread changes that affect us in similar ways. We are learning to meet and pray and worship without being physically present in the same room. We are learning to wear masks when grocery shopping and how to follow the directional arrows in the store. We are learning to be more aware of how our choices (and those of our ancestors) affect not only our lives, but the lives of others.

There are also challenges and changes that are unique to our own lives and families. Some of us need to adapt to medical treatments that change our bodies and abilities. Some are trying to teach or learn through different means, and wondering what the next school year will bring. Some are navigating changing relationships or travel, work or moving, with hurdles and unknowns along the way.

Adaptability is key to both surviving and thriving in times of change. It requires flexibility in our thinking and a surrender of both what is familiar and our desire to control the situation. To adapt well, we also need to accept and face reality as it is. These are not easy things to face, but I believe that they are part of the way God works in our lives and helps us grow.

One of the synonyms for adaptability is pliability. It brings to mind the image of clay on the potter's wheel. The potter can only shape the clay as it yields to the pressure of his or her touch. Isaiah wrote: "O Lord, you are our Father. We are the clay, and you are the potter. We all are formed by your hand" (Isaiah 64:8). The prophet Jeremiah was led to the potter's house to learn how God was feeling about Israel's unwillingness to surrender to his shaping influence. God longed for them to acknowledge the truth of their heart-condition and to be open to his reforming them. Sadly, they replied: "It's no use. We will continue with our own plans; we will all follow the stubbornness of our evil hearts" (Jeremiah 18:12).

Brothers and sisters, may we choose to embrace truth, to surrender to God's shaping Spirit, to trust that our essential identity will not be lost, but rather seen even more clearly. When we are pliable and adaptable in God's hands, we will fulfill our greatest purpose in life ~ to bring glory to God. Paul said it this way: "For God, who said, "Let light shine out of darkness," made his light shine in our hearts to give us the light of the knowledge of God's glory displayed in the face of Christ. But we have this treasure in jars of clay to show that this all-surpassing power is from God and not from us" (2 Corinthians 4:6-7).

As we celebrate Independence Day on the Fourth of July, may we also remember that our freedoms are gifts. They are not given so that we approach life as if it is all about us and what we want. They are given so that we can live out our purpose in harmony with God's will and in harmony with those around us. Doing this well requires awareness, surrender, and adaptability. Perhaps you might join me in praying for the Holy Spirit to help us grow in these areas for God's glory.

The committee is tasked with and committed to planning for the safe return of our congregation to the sanctuary for regular services and celebrations of the Word of God. We are committed to preserving the safety of our congregation in conjunction with the State of Vermont's rules and regulations regarding the COVID19 pandemic. In that light, we choose to do this process of reentry carefully, and have, as a committee, been keeping track of new information and advisories to update the methods we have been exploring.

We are excited to begin limited services in our sanctuary. During the foreseeable future, we will be using the hybrid format for our services. 

On May 3rd, Pastor Rebecca used the following devotional in her sermon. Several people found it powerful. A portion of it is printed here with permission from the author Diane Halliwell.

So, for a time, having studied lots of the Bible, I was getting into theological discussions with people . . . and I must admit, I surely did NOT have all the answers from a theological viewpoint, and sometimes I would allow the discussion to go on and on, being challenged on questions I just could not answer.

Such was the case on a plane ride with my boss at the time. He is a clever kind of guy, and argumentative, and we were engaging in a deep theological discussion. All of a sudden, as I was literally lost for a direction, I clearly felt the leading of the Holy Spirit, and I said this . . . "I cannot answer that question, but what I can tell you is the different that Jesus has made in my life." THAT WAS THE MOMENT I UNDERSTOOD . . . Jesus was NOT a religion to me . . . Jesus was NOT a set of rules for me . . . Jesus was a LIFE-CHANGER for me! My boss could sit there and question everything about Christianity, BUT HE COULD NOT QUESTION HOW I WAS CHANGED . . . how my bitterness and anger changed to forgiveness, how my self-hatred turned to "accepting who I was in Christ" . . . how my protective walls crumbled, and instead of being within myself, Christ taught me to look outward . . . at people who I could help because of how Jesus changed my life . . . SAVED MY LIFE.

All of a sudden my boss' demeanor changed . . . this conversation made him uncomfortable, because he could not control it, he could not argue with it . . . He changed the topic!

From that point forward (and it was about 8 years ago), I understood how I was to share Christ with others. I became the "Samaritan woman at the well", who after her encounter with Jesus, went back to town and talked about His forgiveness, and many followed Him . . . I was the woman the Pharisees wanted to stone because of her sin . . . and in the face of Jesus' lack of condemnation and forgiveness, followed Him . . .
